11B 0.2: It Takes Two: Elements of Successful Mentoring Relationships

PHASE OVERVIEW

This is a pre-match phase which introduces students to the program, the role of the mentor-mentee, and the way the curriculum and classes support them in this work. This phase prepares students to complete their new mentee application for matching. At the end of the phase, students will be prepared to fully participate in the program and will understand the reasoning/benefits of the program.



LESSON OBJECTIVE

SWBAT articulate their roles and responsibilities as a mentee. Students will also be able to identify behaviors and mindsets both mentors and mentees must bring to the relationship for it to be impactful.

PURPOSE

This lesson both builds excitement and investment in the program. This lesson assumes that mentees have a basic understanding of the program and zooms in on the characteristics that pairs can demonstrate to build relationships.

Learn and Engage: Mentorship Qualities		Notes:
To create a vision for and build excitement about what a relationship with a mentor can provide, students will watch a video about a mentor-mentee pair. They'll then discuss the video to identify the characteristics the mentee demonstrates. They'll end by reflecting on the qualities that will set them up for success in the program.		
Slide 3: 1 min	TALKING POINTS If you have completed your consent form, please turn it in. If you have yet to do so, please submit it by	
Slide 4: 1 min	Have a student read the key takeaway: Relationships between mentors and mentees are a give and take, and I have the power to drive my relationship with my mentor.	
	TALKING POINTS Today, we're going to dive deeper into what it means to be part of a mentoring relationship and how you have the power to drive your relationship with your mentor.	
Slide 5: 1 min	TALKING POINTS Hopefully, you've been able to identify some things you have done to build a relationship with an adult mentor. Maybe, you've asked for help, been honest or vulnerable, pushed through when there has been conflict, or communicated consistently.	

Slide 6: 1 min	TALKING POINTS The point is, YOU have the ability to build and drive relationships with adults.	
	This is important because this program is about you and your goals. Your mentor is here to support you, but they can only do that if you are able to create space for that relationship to develop.	
Slide 7: 2 min	TALKING POINTS Let's hear from a mentee/mentor pair, Nancy & Marissa, to better understand this idea.	
	As you watch the video, take notes on what characteristics you see Nancy (the mentee) showing in her relationship with Marissa (mentor) and on her path to college. Make sure to give evidence for each characteristic.	
Slide 8: 3 min	PLAY VIDEO	
Slide 9: 4 min	STUDENT DISCUSSION Have students share their worksheet responses.	
Slide 10: 1 min	TALKING POINTS At first, Nancy was nervous and hesitant about sharing personal things with Marissa. This is totally normal at the beginning of the relationship!	
	Despite being nervous, Nancy was brave and remained open and honest with Marissa which opened the door for trust to develop. There is no one quality that makes a great mentee.	
Slide 11: 1 min	TALKING POINTS Every person has their own strengths and challenges, especially when it comes to building relationships.	
	It's important to reflect on both so that you can appreciate where things will be easy for you and understand where you might run into difficulty.	

Slide 12: 8 min 4 min to write & 4 min for discussion	TALKING POINTS We are going to start off by taking 4 minutes to reflect on the qualities that will make it easy and difficult for us to connect with our mentor. Please turn and talk with a partner and complete the corresponding section on your worksheet. We will share out in a few minutes. You can use the word bank on this slide to help you brainstorm qualities. After students have written down their qualities, invite students to share out.

Slide 13: 8 min 4 min to write & 4 min for discussion	TALKING POINTS We are now going to take 4 minutes to reflect on the qualities that we want in a mentor and qualities that we do not want to see in a mentor. Please turn and talk with a partner and complete the corresponding section on your worksheet. Be as honest as possible, this will help me find you a good mentor match. We will share out in a few minutes. You can use the word bank on this slide to help you brainstorm qualities. After students have written down their qualities, invite students to share out.
