Exams (35% of course grade): consist of a combination of essay questions which you can work on at your own pace, using the book, notes, and discussion forums.

<u>Chapter Quizzes (19% of course grade)</u>: are designed primarily to encourage you to read and study the chapters each week, thus fostering higher quality discussion. Chapter Quizzes therefore have a 16-minute time limit once you begin the quiz (so it is important to read the chapter before beginning the quiz). Quizzes will typically be available for a 33-hour window of time, from 3pm Mondays until midnight (11:55 pm) Tuesdays. Please note that these are not nearly as important to your grade as the Exams and the Discussion Forums. In fact, you can have a D-average on the quizzes and still easily have an A in the course.

Map Assignments (14% of course grade): There are eight total map assignments, but you will only turn maps in twice during the semester (see the course outline for the dates). In other words, I will not collect them every time each map is assigned, but it is still important for you to do them during the week they are required – doing the maps will help you to make sense of the other material. Feel free to submit individual maps early if you want to (I can grade those almost like a "draft" if you wish). You may turn them in using one of these four ways, whichever is most convenient for you:

- 1. Use Photoshop (or similar program of your choice) to complete them and email them to me in Moodle.
- 2. Print the blank maps and then scan (or photograph) your completed maps and send them to me via

Moodle email.

- 3. Drop them off at my office in M238 (if I'm not there, slide them under the door).

Online Discussions (32% of course grade):

The Discussion Forums are the heart of the course – you can think of them as the "classroom" - and they are designed to make this class an interactive experience. Participation in each discussion topic is worth up to 30 points (as you can see, this is nearly a third of your course grade). Points will be based on the quality and quantity of your comments.

Most Forums are two weeks in length, and weeks begin on Wednesday morning. Usually, a new discussion topic will be posted by Thursday afternoon at 3:00 PM and that topic will be open for the rest of the week through Tuesday night. Since there are two weeks per Forum (after Week 1), this means there will usually be two discussion topics (or "threads") per Forum. It is important that you participate during the course of the discussion, not just at the end - see the grading criteria below for more.

Your messages, or "posts," might consist of one or more of the following types:

- 1. your replies to questions by the instructor
- 2. your replies to other student discussion posts
- 3. questions of your own which might spawn more discussion
- 4. your comments or analysis on the reading or topic in question
- 5. your summary of the discussion topic to that point

ATTENDANCE AND LATE POLICIES:

The majority of your participation in this class will occur online. This means "attendance" will be measured by

your online participation. You will be expected to log on to the class a *minimum* of four days a week, and to keep up with the discussions and assignments. You will find that discussion messages from the teacher and other students pile up pretty quickly.

If you feel like you may have to drop the course, please talk to me first – sometimes there are solutions and alternatives that you may not know about. Failure to participate in the class for more than a week without contacting me *may* result in an automatic drop from the course. However, I will not *necessarily* drop you from the class – it is your responsibility to officially drop the course if needed. If you stop attending without dropping the course you may receive an F on your transcript.

<u>How much time should you spend on the course?</u> Remember that if this were an on campus course, you would be in the classroom for 3 hours a week. Of course, you would also spend 2-6 hours outside of class on homework and studying (right?). In other words you should expect to spend between about 5-9 hours a week on this class, just as you would in an on campus course.

<u>Late Assignments</u>: Late exams and assignments will be deducted **10%** in grade and will *not* be accepted more than twenty four hours late. Chapter Quizzes cannot be made up – if you fail to complete a quiz on time it will be a zero (However, I will drop your lowest Chapter Quiz score at the end of the semester).
