











General Education Teachers: 12 indicated no opinion, 37 voted for intervention model, 55 voted for



General Education Teachers: 14 indicated no opinion, 29 voted for maintaining paraprofessionals, 61 voted for classroom reduction


Paraprofessionals (all groups): 9 voted for classroom reduction, 0 voted for maintaining paraprofessionals

Staff, parents, and students were asked to force rank the following 6 items in order of priority.


- Class size (reducing classroom enrollment below what is either legally required or contractually negotiated)


Teachers rank class size as the most important area of priority with intervention support as the second most important area of priority.

Parent Perspective




Parents rank class size as the most important area of priority with school safety being the second most important area of priority.

Student Perspective




Students rank school safety as the most important area of priority with mental health supports being the second most important area of priority.


