

World Religions

Course Overview

This one quarter class will cover the five main world religions, Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism, as well as an overview of other religions. The class will focus on some of the issues that come up when considering religion historically and today.

Course Requirements

Summative Assessment Policy (for end-of-unit tests, essays, and projects):

TEST CORRECTIONS: Students can complete test corrections in order to learn from their mistakes. Students will be able to earn half the points back from test corrections. *In order to complete corrections, students must have all formative assignments from the unit completed.* All formatives and corrections must be completed before the end of the next unit. All test corrections are to be completed in school.

Late Work and Missing Work Policy:

Homework and classwork (formatives) will be accepted within the unit, for partial credit, prior to the summative test, project, or paper. After the summative, late formatives for that unit will only be accepted with test corrections.
