ENRICHING EXPERIENCES

Boy Scouts of America (2020/21/22/23/24/25) - Since 6th grade, Boy Scouts has occupied nearly every one of my Monday nights. Throughout this program, I have learned a lot about the outdoors, citizenship, and various aspects of life, including community service, teamwork, and leadership. I have held various leadership positions in scouting, such as Patrol Leader, Chaplain, Historian, and Assistant Senior Patrol Leader, all of which have enhanced my leadership skills. Additionally, I have had the opportunity to participate in trips around the country, including visits to the Florida Keys and New Mexico and many local adventures in North and South Carolina. My most significant achievement is earning the rank of Eagle Scout, which requires a substantial time commitment, dedication, and effort. This accomplishment involved completing a service project benefiting my community, earning numerous merit badges, and undergoing a series of

interviews. Boy Scouts of America is immensely meaningful to me because it has played a pivotal role in shaping who I am today and has had the most significant impact on my life.

Serve Orlando Mission Project (2024) - Serve Orlando was my first mission trip outside of North Carolina, and it turned out to be an incredible experience. Most of our work involved behind-the-scenes tasks, such as cooking and organizing, highlighting the effort required to make service possible. We also had opportunities to assist people experiencing homelessness directly, and every interaction was wholesome and heartwarming. Many of the individuals we met were actively working to improve their overall situation, and the organization we worked with provided support to help them reach their goals. This experience was very impactful for me, as I had never encountered homelessness on such a scale before, and it felt meaningful to contribute to the efforts of non-profit organizations.

North Carolina State University - General Engineering Camp (2024) - My entire life, I have always said, "I want to be an engineer when I grow up, just like my dad." I could see what my future might look like for the first time at NCSU. During a week-long day camp, we participated in various activities that introduced us to different types of engineering and the engineering process. Each day, we worked in groups on a project that lasted throughout the week. This was my favorite part of the camp because it felt like doing a project in a real-world context that helped people.

Big Heart Orphanage- Mexico Mission Project (2025) - Big Heart Orphanage will always hold a special place in my heart because of the eye-opening experience it provided me. It was my first time in Mexico, and it allowed me to see how different my life is from many others worldwide. In the village where we served, there were issues with alcohol abuse, and many residents lived in extreme poverty. Most of the children lacked active male figures in their lives, making the orphanage a crucial part of the community. Throughout the week, I worked on various construction projects, and what my group accomplished in a week would typically take the regular crew at the orphanage three months to complete. This trip taught me that I often take my circumstances for granted and highlighted how much we can do to help make the world a better place.
