## Familiar Commands (Tell a friend to do, or not do something)

Affirmative

Commands:

TO TELL A
FRIEND TO DO
SOMETHING.

The normal "Ella/Usted" form OR....

(Unless it's a "Vin Diesel" form!!)

"Vin Diesel has ten weapons":

Command	From	Meaning
Ven	Venir	"Come"
Di	Decir	"Say"
Sal	Leave	"Leave"
Haz	Make/ Do	"Make/Do"
Ten	Tener	"Have"
Ve	Ir	"Go"
Pon	Poner	"Put"
Sé	Ser	"Be"

## The normal "Ella/Usted" form, Regular "ella" command form examples:

Come algo = eat something

Trabaja duro = work hard

Escribe esto = write this

Abre la puerta = open the door

**Cuenta el dinero = count the money** 

Estudia esta noche = study tonight

## Irregular "Vin Diesel" form examples:

Ve allí = go there

Ven aquí = come here

Di algo = say something

Sé amable = be kind.

Negative commands:


TO TELL A
FRIEND *NOT*<u>TO DO</u>
SOMETHING.

The "opposite ending" tú form.

For all "opposite ending tú" forms:

- 1. Start with the "yo" form.
- 2. Remove the "o".
- 3. Add the opposite ending.

[AR verbs: opposite = es]
[IR/ER verbs: opposite =a s]



Note: there are a few (6) verbs that do not have a "yo" form that ends in "O", so we use specific forms to create the negative commands:

Modified Verb Form	Infinitive	Negative command form	Command meaning
SEPA	Don't know	No sepas	Don't know
SEA	To be	No seas	Don't be
HAYA	NA	NA	NA
VAYA	To go	No vayas	Don't go
DÉ	To give	No dés	Don't give
ESTÉ	To be	No estés	Don't be
Rarely or	never used	as a negative	command.
