Syllabus: Advanced Placement Language and Composition

Course Description:

Students in this introductory college-level course read and carefully analyze a broad and challenging range of nonfiction and fiction selections, deepening their awareness of rhetoric and how language works. Through close reading and frequent writing, students develop their ability to work with language and text with a greater awareness of purpose and strategy, while strengthening their own composing abilities. Course readings feature expository, analytical, personal, and argumentative texts from a variety of authors and historical contexts. The course is constructed in accordance with the guidelines described in the AP English Course Description. It will adhere to the guidelines set by the *College Board's Advanced Placement Course Description* and prepare students for the AP Exam, receive Advanced Placement, and earn college credit where applicable (*College Board*). AP Exam:

Students may take the Advanced Placement Exam to be eligible for college credit. Neither the College Board nor the High School awards AP credit. Students need to find out from colleges to which they are planning to apply whether the institution grants credit and/or uses AP scores for placement. It is IMPORTANT that students obtain each school's policy IN WRITING so that when actually choosing one's college and registering, there is proof of that policy.

Students will create an account and submit written work to <u>turnitin.com</u>. This website is designed as a tool to ensure students properly give credit to others' ideas and words.

Academic Integrity. The honest representation of students' work is essential to a productive learning experience. More importantly, academic integrity is a reflection of individual character. Please refer to my District Website for my academic dishonesty policy.

Attendance Policy. Each student's presence is vital in order to fully develop skills and explore concepts during class discussion. Students are expected to be in their seats and ready to begin class when the bell rings. Lateness is not accepted; a student's first lateness is a teacher warning; a student's second lateness is a teacher detention; a student's third lateness is a disciplinary referral (this restarts each Quarter). When a student misses class or has an upcoming absence, it is the student's responsibility to gather class materials via Google Classroom or the classroom's Missed Assignments Folder.

Late Assignment Policy. Homework is due at the beginning of class, and late homework is not accepted. Level 3 assignments will be accepted (-10) a day for up to 10 days.

Materials. Student iPad (access to Google Classroom); students are NOT permitted to access Google Classroom via their cell phones within the classroom.

Cell Phones/Electronic Devices. Technology is an incredible tool that should be utilized and integrated in the classroom. However, cell phones and other electronic devices often distract learners from

interpersonal interactions required to be proficient communicators of both the spoken and written word. These devices should NOT be visible or used once students walk in the classroom (unless otherwise permitted by the teacher).
