

SkillsUSA students make a significant impact at the 2025 National Leadership and Skills Conference.



Students from Tennessee's College/Postsecondary (C/PS) Career and Technical Education programs proudly showcased their talents at the 2025 SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference (NLSC), held June 23–27 in Atlanta. This premier event included leadership training, community service activities, and competitive demonstrations of technical skill. Throughout the week, Tennessee students exemplified professionalism, determination, and excellence—both in leadership roles and in rigorous national competitions—highlighting the strength and quality of CTE programs across the state.

Leadership

Tennessee's SkillsUSA State Officers—Tori Meyers, Cassady Taylor, Kady Mitchell, Tanner Ashlock, and Kricket Jones—attended the 2025 SkillsUSA Leverage Training, held June 20–23 in Atlanta. This intensive pre-conference experience focused on developing leadership through the 17 Essential Elements of the SkillsUSA Framework. A special highlight came as Tennessee C/PS Treasurer Tanner Ashlock was elected as a SkillsUSA National Officer. Throughout the week, Tanner campaigned passionately, earning delegate support by pledging to represent Tennessee's college system and advocate for students on the national stage.

Additional professional development opportunities included the **SkillsUSA Academy of Excellence** and **SkillsUSA University**, where students engaged in hands-on learning and leadership growth. All participants earned certificates to add to their professional development portfolios—valuable credentials that align with SkillsUSA's mission of building personal, workplace, and technical skills grounded in academics.

At the heart of the conference is a unique tradition: **pin trading**. With over 18,000 attendees, students enthusiastically traded custom-designed pins with peers, advisors, and industry leaders. It's more than a game—it's a vibrant way to build connections.

Tennessee's **Lauren Presley's Boot Pin** became one of the most sought-after designs, while even **Executive Director Chelle Travis** joined in the fun, using her signature pin to spark conversations. Pin trading creates lasting memories and friendships across the country.

Tennessee's presence was felt throughout the event, including the strong leadership of **Scott Mull**, the 2024–25 National Officer, who helped run the conference and represented CTE students nationwide with pride and professionalism.

Community Service

On the final day of the conference, SkillsUSA members had the opportunity to give back through the impactful "Complete the Cycle" community service project. In just three hours, students came together to assemble 80 children's bicycles, which were then donated to the Boys & Girls Club of Metro Atlanta. The event was a powerful reminder that leadership isn't just about achievement—it's also about service, compassion, and community impact.

This service initiative reflects one of the core values of SkillsUSA: **developing leaders with a heart for service**. It offers members a tangible way to make a difference in the lives of others while reinforcing essential personal and workplace skills like teamwork, responsibility, and communication.

Community service is a key pillar of SkillsUSA's **Framework** and is integrated into each chapter's **Program of Work**. Chapters that go above and beyond in service, leadership, and student engagement are recognized nationally through the prestigious **Models of Excellence** program, which celebrates outstanding achievement across SkillsUSA colleges and postsecondary institutions. Projects like "Complete the Cycle" exemplify how students can turn their technical skills and leadership training into meaningful, real-world impact—leaving not

only a lasting impression on the communities they serve, but also shaping the character and confidence of every student involved.

Championships

During the 2025 SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference (NLSC), Tennessee's CTE students rose to the occasion, showcasing their technical and leadership talents in high-stakes, hands-on competitions. Tennessee College/ Post Secondary leads the nation in receiving the most medals in the college/post-secondary division. Representing 24 colleges across the state, the SkillsUSA Tennessee College/Postsecondary delegation brought 255 members to the national stage in Atlanta. Of those, 150 students competed in 84 of the 110 available technical, trade, and leadership events—a powerful demonstration of Tennessee's commitment to excellence in Career and Technical Education (CTE).

Students competed in a wide range of occupational areas, including **electronics**, **computer-aided drafting**, **precision machining**, **medical assisting**, **and culinary arts**. These contests are designed and judged in collaboration with industry leaders, trade associations, and labor organizations, ensuring that all events reflect current, real-world standards. Leadership events also tested vital employability skills in areas like **extemporaneous speaking**, **job interviewing**, and **parliamentary procedure**.

The results were exceptional. Tennessee students earned a total of **52 national**medals—including **27 gold**, **9 silver**, and **16 bronze**—and placed in the top **10 in 69 of the 84**contests they entered. This means that Tennessee ranked in the top 10 in **82%** of all events entered and placed in the top five in more than half, underscoring the remarkable quality of Tennessee's CTE programs.

Tennessee's success extended beyond the podium. The state was recognized for having the for being the **largest college delegation in the nation**, boasting over **16,200 members statewide**. These accolades reflect not only Tennessee's growth but also its leadership in building a career-ready workforce.

Winners of each contest received **gold**, **silver**, **or bronze medallions**, and many also earned valuable **tools of their trade**, **scholarships**, and even **on-the-spot job offers**—making NLSC a launching pad for students' future careers.

In addition to medals, Tennessee students earned **58 Skills Point Certificates** through the **SkillsUSA Skill Point Certification Program**. These prestigious certificates are awarded to contestants who meet or exceed rigorous industry-defined standards in their competitions. Developed in partnership with employers and trade experts, these benchmarks reflect the technical and professional excellence expected in today's workforce. Earning a Skills Point Certificate signals that a student is not only competition-ready but **career-ready from day one**.

The SkillsUSA Championships serve as the nation's premier showcase of CTE talent, with thousands of middle school, high school, and college students from across all 50 states and U.S. territories competing. As a **student-led organization**, SkillsUSA champions the skilled trades, bridging the gap between education and industry. Tennessee's outstanding performance once again proves that its students are among the best-prepared in the nation—ready to lead, innovate, and build the future of America's workforce.

Tennessee Delegation Meetings at NLSC

The excitement officially began on **Monday evening** with the opening of the **SkillsUSA Tennessee** C/**PS Delegation Meeting**. This high-energy kickoff event welcomed students,

advisors, and guests, providing essential information about the week ahead at the **National Leadership and Skills Conference (NLSC)**. College teams received conference schedules, key contacts for support, and helpful tips for navigating the massive event.

To foster team spirit and make Tennessee's presence unmistakable, all members received a **swag bundle** that included conference t-shirts and polos, state pins for trading, branded conference bags, and black light-up hats—perfect for standing out during opening ceremonies at **State Farm Arena**. The conference concluded in grand fashion with the SkillsUSA Tennessee C/PS Celebration Banquet on Friday evening. State Director Daphne Brown, along with the Tennessee State Officer Team and state staff, led the evening by announcing competition results, celebrating medalists, and honoring those who contributed to Tennessee's incredible success.

The dedication of SkillsUSA advisors was highlighted in a special moment of appreciation, as over **100 advisors** were acknowledged for their tireless support, mentorship, and leadership throughout the year. Their commitment was evident not only in student performance but in the overall growth and strength of Tennessee's delegation.

Special guests in attendance included **college presidents**, **Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR)** staff, and **Assistant Vice Chancellor Michael Tinsley**, whose presence underscored the state's commitment to excellence in Career and Technical Education.

A major highlight of the evening was the presentation of the **Outstanding Advisor of the Year Award**, given to **Donald Drinkard** of **TCAT Henry/Carroll**. A special moment of appreciation was reserved for sixteen representatives from Nissan, who were in attendance and recognized for their unwavering support and commitment to SkillsUSA Tennessee College/Postsecondary. As a valued industry partner, Nissan's dedication to workforce development, mentorship, and career readiness has left a lasting mark on the program. The room erupted in applause in gratitude for all that the Nissan team continues to do to support Tennessee's students, educators, and the future skilled workforce.

From the opening delegation meeting to the closing banquet, the week was a celebration of talent, leadership, teamwork, and Tennessee pride. Students, advisors, alumni, and partners left inspired—ready to carry the momentum of SkillsUSA forward into classrooms, communities, and careers across the state.

Workforce Development Opportunities

The 2025 SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference offered numerous opportunities for engagement with business and industry partners, far beyond the annual TECHSPO, which featured hundreds of companies supporting Career and Technical Education (CTE).

One standout event was the Sunday night rooftop networking reception, where state directors connected with industry leaders from John Deere, Kiewit, NEIEP, and the American Red Cross. Additionally, SkillsUSA hosted its first-ever **Workforce Development Summit**, attended by Daphne Brown and Michael Tinsley. This landmark event brought together industry leaders, educators, and policymakers to address urgent workforce challenges and explore strategies for collaborative impact.

The Summit featured expert panels that focused on key goals:

- Strengthening industry-education alignment
- Advancing workforce readiness and retention
- Shaping effective workforce development policies
- Expanding career opportunities for students
- Amplifying SkillsUSA's national impact

Highlights included presentations from Bharani Rajakumar, founder and CEO of Transfer Inc., and DJ Jordan of Aerotek, who both spoke on the growing urgency of closing the skills gap. Another standout session, "Investing in the Nation's Infrastructure," focused on long-term workforce sustainability and readiness.

Global Perspectives were also explored in "Global Insights: Innovations in Skills Development," featuring David Hoey, CEO of WorldSkills International, who offered a forward-looking view on the evolution of global talent pipelines.

Two featured panel discussions added tremendous value:

- 1. **The Workforce Exchange** | **A Conversation on Talent, Training, and Policy** Experts in policy, apprenticeships, and pipeline development discussed systemic challenges and opportunities in upskilling America's workforce.
- 2. Bridging the Skills Gap | Aligning Education, Industry, and Policy for Workforce Success This session emphasized the power of cross-sector collaboration in building the skilled labor force of tomorrow.

Attendees also participated in **Roundtable Discussions** led by subject-matter experts, fostering small-group conversations on workforce challenges and real-time solutions. These interactive discussions encouraged shared insights and collaborative problem-solving.

Another notable event was an exclusive dinner hosted by **Georgia Pacific** and the **National Roofing Contractors Association**, where state directors and special guests explored partnership opportunities and curriculum development. Advisors were invited to engage directly with national employers and discuss how industry can better support the evolving needs of CTE programs.

Together, these events created a unique and valuable network of support for state directors and stakeholders working in the CTE and workforce development space—highlighting SkillsUSA's role as a national leader in connecting education with real-world industry needs.
