





# **Indigenous Role Models**

Each month we will highlight a living Indigenous Role model.

Autumn Peltier is from the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory and she is a water protector and Chief Water Commissioner for the Anishinabek Nation. Autumn is just 15 years old, but she is an internationally recognized advocate for clean water, especially in Indigenous communities. From a young age she learned about the sacredness of water. Through these teachings, she began to understand the global implications of what humans were doing to the planet and started advocating for clean drinking water. She understands that she is a future ancestor, and has a responsibility to preserve the land for generations to come. One of her most well known quotes is that "We can't eat money or drink oil." When she was 12 years old, she was selected to present Prime Minister Justin Trudeau with a water bundle. Although she had a speech prepared,

she became overwhelmed with emotion and confronted Trudeau. She informed him that she was not happy with the decisions he was making that affected her people. When she was 14, she inherited the title of <a href="Chief Water Commissioner">Chief Water Commissioner</a> from her great-aunt Josephine Mandamin. She has tirelessly continued to use her voice to bring awareness to water issues. Autumn's activist work has earned her recognition worldwide. She has spoken in front of the United Nations on several occasions. She was also nominated for the 2019 International Children's Peace Prize. Despite her accolades, her work is guided by her people and her deep respect for the Earth and the environment.







## **Tah'lum Indigenous Artist Collective Colouring Book: Volume II**

"The purpose of this colouring book project is to create a new way to engage children and adults alike with Indigenous languages; namely, the SENĆOŦEN language spoken by WSÁNEĆ peoples of the BOKEĆEN (Pauquachin), MÁLEXEŁ (Malahat), ¼Á,UTW\_(Tsawout), WJOŁEŁP (Tsartlip), and WSÍKEM (Tseycum) Nations, as well as others along the Saanich Peninsula and Southern Gulf and San Juan Islands. The images and words in this colouring book were selected by artists Sarah Jim (WSÁNEĆ) and Natassia Davies (Coast Salish/Welsh/Scottish with familial roots in T'Sou-ke Nation) to provide a small window into their heritage. These designs are meant to be enjoyed by the community for all ages."
