



**Kick-Off Workshop on
Strengthening Labour Market Information Systems in ASEAN Member States (ALMIS)
as A Basis for Better Skills and Employment Policies**

9 December 2021, Ha Noi, Viet Nam and Virtual

PROGRAMME

Context

On 26 June 2020, the *ASEAN Declaration on Human Resources Development for the Changing World of Work* was adopted at the 36th ASEAN Summit. The Declaration calls for the development of concrete strategies and actions that contribute to the realisation of the ASEAN Vision 2025 of a people-centred ASEAN Community where people enjoy higher quality of life and the benefits of community building, with especial emphasis on developing human resources through closer cooperation among ASEAN Member States in education and lifelong learning.

This project is part of this process, aimed at strengthening the capacities of ASEAN Member States to anticipate and match future skills needs through effective labour market information systems, developing a set of evidence-based recommendations in selected thematic areas with the objective to facilitate policy dialogue; and building capacities of ASEAN Member States to develop national action plans for improvement of the labour market information systems

As one of the kick-off activities of this project, this workshop is organized to level-off expectations and understanding from among key stakeholders. The workshop aims to lay the foundation of an operations manual, that contains the principles, guidelines, and procedures for the conduct of project. This also includes, among others, an agreement of the desired goals of the project, an agreed set of indicators to gauge progress, and the roles and contributions of each stakeholder. Finally, an operations manual also includes the structure and scope of activities, the manner by which activities are selected, and cross-cutting themes that needs to be considered in the implementation of activities.
