Course Description and Goals

Communication Scholarship is an intensive research, writing, and ethics course for communication studies majors. Students will receive instruction in conducting secondary research within scholarly literature, and disciplinary writing practices necessary for successful upper division writing in the major. Students will also develop an understanding of key elements of communication scholarship, including a basic overview of the role of research writing, adapting writing for an academic audience, learning how to summarize and critique prior research, and maintaining integrity in writing. This course meets the General Education requirement for Writing Intensive coursework.

Catalogue description: “Writing skills course for communication studies majors that addresses issues in communication scholarship, including practical applications of theory and research in communication, communication journals and the publication process, how to conduct a scholarly literature review, how to write a scholarly research paper in communication studies, and how to write on a professional level.”
Prerequisites: ENGL 130 (or its equivalent) with a grade of C- or better. *Note: To meet the prerequisite for upper-division work in the Communication Studies major, students must pass CMST 331 with a final grade of C- or better.*

Research in teaching and learning consistently demonstrates that a sense of belonging in the classroom is one of the foundations for a healthy and productive learning environment. Therefore, everyone in the class - myself included - are expected to help create a supportive, respectful, safe environment in our classroom, free of hate speech or derogatory remarks that question the belonging or dignity of others. Differing viewpoints are a natural part of the learning process, but we should also aim to express our viewpoints while maintaining respect for others and for the classroom environment itself. Finally, learning respect and inclusion is a lifelong commitment: if I communicate exclusion or disrespect for you in any way, please let me know so that I can correct and learn from my mistakes.

This course utilizes Canvas as an online platform for delivering class content and for class updates or notifications. Additionally, timely announcements may also be delivered via your Chico State email account. So, checking in regularly on these platforms is vital for your success in this class.

Attendance and Participation Requirements

You really cannot afford to miss class unnecessarily. However, if cases arise when you must miss class, please take note of the following guidelines: (1) **You are responsible** for the course concepts, class activities, assignments, **and announcements** that were discussed or took place in class on the day you missed. You should anticipate that you did miss something important. You have at least two options for getting updates about them: (a) ask a fellow classmate or (b) come to my office hours. (2) **Do not email me asking what you missed** – unfortunately, it is not feasible for me to write out summaries of our class activities and lectures for all students who miss class. (3) **If you missed a day when there were activity points earned, then you will need to visit my office hours to make up the activity and earn back the points.** Similarly, if you miss a class when a major assignment is due, you are still responsible for turning in that assignment before the deadline, unless you have made specific arrangements with me ahead of time.

Assessments / Assignments

- 1. “Research in the Wild” Paper (50 points)** - After reading a pair of articles – one a scholarly research article and the other a news media article discussing that research – you will write a 2.5-3.5 page paper assessing how well the media article represented the research.
- 2. Comm Topic Exploration Paper (100 points)** - In a 3-4 page essay, you will begin developing a semester-long research topic by: (1) describing a ‘real-life’ communication phenomenon that requires investigation, (2) asking research questions that explore what is unknown and/or problematic about it; and (3) finding and reviewing two peer-reviewed research articles that contribute to better understanding the research questions you specified. More information about this assignment will be provided when it is introduced in class.
- 3. Comm Topic Audio/Visual Research Exploration (150 points)** - For this assignment, you will find and relate research on your research topic by choosing one of two options: (a) design an Infographic about your communication research topic using data drawn from scholarly articles; or (b) record a 20-minute audio podcast in which you and a partner discuss research articles that helpfully explore a research topic that you both have in common. For both options, you will share the results of your work with classmates, either through a brief presentation or by posting your recorded podcast. More information about this assignment will be provided when it is introduced in class.
- 4. Comm Topic Lit Review Term Paper (200 points)** - In 6-7 pages, you will develop a professional quality research paper that identifies and summarizes relevant peer-reviewed research addressing the communication topic and research question(s) you have chosen to explore. You will present the results of your research during the final exam period. This term paper builds upon and culminates the communication topic research that you have chosen as a basis for the prior two assignments (#5 and #6 above).
- 5. APA Exam (100 points)** - This exam will assess your understanding of APA style & how to properly cite scholarship.
- 6. Rough Drafts & Peer Reviews (3 @ 40 pts each; 120 points total)** - Three times this semester, you will be required to provide a completed early draft of your papers to participate in formal review sessions with/for your fellow classmates. These days are specified on our course calendar. You will earn up to 20 points for providing your completed rough draft, and then you will earn up to an additional 20 points for reviewing a fellow classmate’s draft. It is vital that peer reviews are completed in-person on the days specified in the course schedule; therefore, *you should prioritize being in class (with your completed draft) on these peer review days.*
- 7. In-Class Exercises / Quizzes (130 points)** - We will have frequent in-class activities involving the writing and research process, and/or APA style. These activities typically result in work that you will turn in at the end of class, worth 10 points each. We will have two in-class quizzes, primarily early in the semester, to ensure that you are attending class regularly and completing assigned readings. *Missed quizzes and activities can only be made up during office hours.*

- 8. Class Participation & Professionalism (100 points)** - Active class participation is central to my teaching approach and this class is designed around it. Class meetings will typically include 20-30 minute lectures followed by group activities or class discussion. It is therefore critical that everyone attend class, act professionally and contribute meaningfully in order build an inclusive and enjoyable classroom culture. Accordingly, you will be evaluated for the way that you contribute to our classroom environment. Professionalism is demonstrated through clear preparation and class contributions that are respectful and constructive. Excellent participation grades also have the benefit of providing you with a strong argument for pushing your final grade higher in cases where you end up right on the border between two grades.
