The six important points that must be included in the introduction should give a clear description of the following aspects (1) a brief general background of the study; (2) state of the art (a brief literature review) of previous study to justify the novelty of the article made (should refer to journals in the last 10 years); (3) gap analysis or gap statement (originality) or novelty statement or uniquely difference to the research compared to the previous study or based on state of the art (in terms of the importance of the research and comparison of uniqueness of the previous research); (4) problems and / or hypotheses (if any); (5) problem-solving approach (if any); (6) expected results or research objectives. Reference is written in the **APA 6th Edition** Bodynote format. 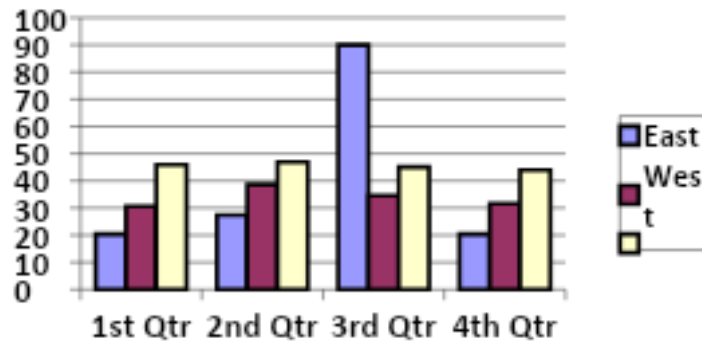
