Get ready to think critically about the benefits and hidden costs of industrialization as it reshaped lives, communities, and the environment worldwide.

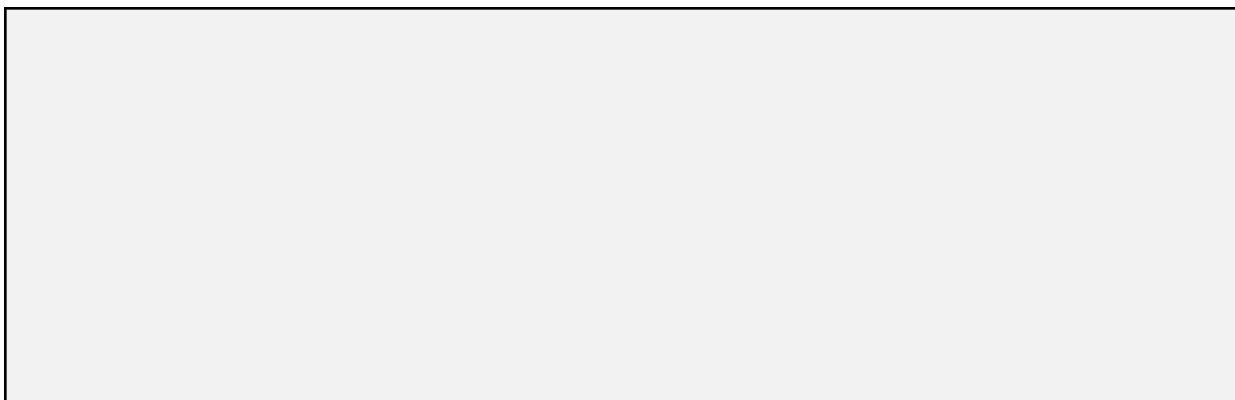
Process

1. Imagine that you are the leader of a country in the 1800s. The Industrial Revolution is sweeping across the globe, bringing powerful new technologies. Should your country embrace industrialization and reap the benefits of progress but risk the downsides? Or should it hold back and preserve tradition but risk being left behind? Weigh the pros and cons of each scenario and decide what would be best for the citizens of your country.

Scenario A: *Foreign investors want to build factories in your country. These factories would create thousands of jobs and produce goods at lower costs, which would allow for economic growth. However, the factory machinery is noisy and will pollute the air and water. Will you allow the factories to be built, thereby bringing jobs but risking environmental impact? Circle your choice below and explain your answer.*

Scenario B: *A foreign company offers to build a railroad through your country, promising to connect towns and make transportation faster. However, the railroad would cut through farmland, displacing farmers and reducing available land for crops.
