I. Areas of Focus for 2021-2022

- 1. Collaboration with other nonprofit, non-partisan groups in the community on voter registration and programming

II. Goals for 2021-2022 (add ideas!)

- 1. Involve a greater number of volunteers in activities for the League
 - a. Increase membership by 20% (120 members)
 - b. Provide opportunities to engage all members in volunteer work

- c. Youth Centers
 - i. Chrysalis house etc. (Contact Tip for specific centers)
 - ii. Offer community service hours to youth for work with the League
- 3. Get creative to connect with people virtually during COVID.
 - a. Better use of Outreach Circle
 - i. LWVUS Organizing Committee Trainings and office hours
 - ii. Short trainings incorporated into Board meetings
 - Outreach to college students have had new student members, but seems to be related toRedistricting Speaking Tour
 - i. Get students involved with the League and
 - ii. Educate on voting issues -
 - iii. Hannah Kopf may have specific contacts
 - c. Make T-shirts and buttons (wear during Zoom meetings to promote League)
 - d. Casual meetings (happy hour byob) via Zoom
 - i. Weekly or bi weekly meeting with specific meeting time, people can come and go as please
 - ii. Happy Hour or Bring Your Own Wine and Cheese
 - iii. Each meeting centered around a specific issue to provide a starting point of conversation, (i.e. racial inequities); use issues in which participants have interest to guide topics for next meeting (although does not have to be strictly structured and each meeting the conversation can evolve naturally. The idea is not to have too much structure as to be constrictive, but to provide some structure so the meeting is topical and relevant to the League
 - iv. Goals: Membership Committee has helped with this work!!
 - 1. Reduce barrier to entry (increase fun factor)
 - 2. Learn more about members' interests and skills
 - 3. By utilizing the connections and information about people's strengths, connect them with volunteer opportunities within the League that resonate with them

4. Build Capacity

- a. Recruit new members/ involving new members in their areas of interest per personal contacts by present members.
 - We should recruit members from known minority organization (NAACP, Urban League, sororities, Links, etc). These organizations have voting rights goals and we can help them meet those goals.
 - ii. Sign up opportunities
- b. Training for skills to make members more effective in advocacy work.
 - i. General Skills
 - Members engage with LWVUS: Community calls/ Organizing trainings
 - 2. Identify Community Resources
 - 3. How to use Google sheets to organize
 BIG WIN!! Transition to Google Workspace, adopting League
 emails. Comfort with ZOOM
 - ii. Advocacy Skills
 - 1. Voter registration training
 - 2. How to speak to people about why it is important to vote
 - 3. How to contact an elected representative (Outreach Circle)
 - 4. Training sessions for observer corp.(Initial session)
- c. Create an internship for college students
 - Community Service hours
