School Arrival & Campus Access

Starting Your Day at Rossview

A great day begins with arriving on time, prepared to learn, and ready to contribute to our school community. The following information will help ensure a safe and efficient start to each school day.

Transportation & Parking

Arrive Safely. Leave Responsibly.

Whether you ride the bus, drive yourself, are dropped off by a parent, or walk to school, every Hawk plays an important role in maintaining a safe and orderly campus.

Following transportation and parking expectations helps keep traffic moving, protects pedestrians, and ensures a smooth arrival and dismissal for everyone.

Driving to School

Driving to school is a privilege that comes with important responsibilities. Students who drive to campus are expected to operate their vehicles safely, follow all traffic laws, and help maintain a safe environment for everyone on campus.

To receive a parking permit, students must:

- Hold a valid driver's license.
- Provide proof of current insurance.
- Have no outstanding school debts.
- Purchase a Rossview parking permit.

Parking permits are sold by the Associated Student Government for **\$30** while spaces remain available. Permits must be clearly displayed from the front windshield whenever a vehicle is parked on campus.

Students who need a permit after the beginning of the school year should submit an application to Dr. Braem. If parking is available, instructions will be sent to the student's school email account.

Parking Eligibility

Students who accumulated **nine or more unexcused absences AND/OR disciplinary referrals** during the previous school year may not be eligible to purchase a parking permit until second semester. Eligibility will be reviewed based on attendance and discipline during the current school year.

Student Parking Expectations

Students who drive to school are expected to:

- Park only in the designated student parking lot.
- Drive safely and follow the posted **15 MPH** campus speed limit.
- Remain out of parking areas during the school day unless authorized by an administrator.
- Follow all Tennessee traffic laws while entering and leaving campus.

Vehicles parked in unauthorized locations may be towed at the owner's expense. Rossview High School is not responsible for loss of or damage to vehicles or personal belongings left inside vehicles. Students are responsible for everything contained inside the vehicle they drive to school. Drivers are also responsible for the behavior of any passengers they transport to campus. Tennessee law prohibits using a cell phone to talk on or send/read a text message while driving. Driving recklessly or in an unsafe manner, such as passing a school bus either parked or in motion, may result in the student being prohibited from driving on campus.

School Buses

School bus transportation is a privilege and an extension of the school day. Students are expected to demonstrate the same respectful behavior on the bus that is expected inside the classroom.

Students should:

- Arrive at their assigned bus stop on time.
- Follow all directions given by the driver.
- Remain seated while the bus is moving.
- Treat fellow students and the driver with respect.

Repeated misconduct may result in the loss of bus transportation privileges.

Students who need bus route information may visit the Transportation section of the CMCSS website or contact the Transportation Department at **931-358-4089**.

Parent Drop-Off and Pick-Up

To help traffic move safely and efficiently:

- Use only designated drop-off and pick-up locations.
- Follow staff directions and posted traffic patterns.
- Remain patient during busy arrival and dismissal times.
- Do not stop in fire lanes, crosswalks, or bus loading areas.

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Families are encouraged to allow additional travel time during the first weeks of school and during special events.

Walking to and From School

Students who walk to school should:

- Use sidewalks and designated crosswalks whenever available.
- Follow directions from crossing guards and staff.
- Remain aware of traffic at all times.
- Avoid distractions while crossing streets or parking lots.

Safety should always come first.

Bicycle and Other Personal Transportation

Students who ride bicycles or other approved personal transportation should:

- Secure their equipment in designated areas.
- Follow all applicable traffic laws.
- Exercise caution around pedestrians and vehicles.

Motorized personal transportation devices must comply with district policy.

Vehicle Searches

Vehicles parked on school property may be subject to search when permitted by law and district policy. Students who choose to bring a vehicle onto campus acknowledge their responsibility to comply with school expectations regarding safety and security.

Under ALL circumstances, students are responsible for any items in the vehicle they drive to school. In addition, drivers are responsible for the actions of their passengers.

Safety Is Everyone's Responsibility

Every arrival and dismissal is a team effort. Whether you drive, ride the bus, walk, or are dropped off, your choices help keep Rossview High School safe, organized, and welcoming for everyone.

When we show patience, follow procedures, and look out for one another, we demonstrate what it means to be a Hawk.

Visitors

To help maintain a safe learning environment, all visitors must check in through the main office upon arrival. Visitors must be accompanied by a CMCSS employee at all times.

Visitors are required to:

- Present a valid government-issued photo ID.
- Wear a visitor badge while on campus.
- Remain with a CMCSS employee throughout their visit.

Students may not bring younger siblings, relatives, or guests to attend classes during the school day.

OpenGate Security Screening

A Safe Start to Every School Day

The safety of our students, staff, and visitors is one of Rossview High School's highest priorities. To help maintain a secure learning environment, everyone entering the building passes through the OpenGate security screening system each morning.

OpenGate is designed to identify prohibited items while allowing students to enter the building quickly and efficiently. Most students pass through the system in just a few seconds without stopping.

By arriving prepared and following the procedures below, you help create a safe, welcoming environment and ensure everyone gets to class on time.

Morning Arrival Checklist

Before leaving home, take a moment to make sure you are ready for the day.

- ✓ Backpack checked
- ✓ Prohibited items left at home
- ✓ Arrive at school on time
- ✓ Ready to learn

A quick backpack check each morning can help prevent delays during the screening process.

What to Expect

When you arrive at school each morning:

1. Walk directly to the OpenGate entrance.
2. Follow directions provided by school staff.
3. Walk through the screening system at a normal pace.
4. If the system alerts, a staff member will guide you through a brief secondary screening.
5. Once cleared, proceed directly to your first destination.

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Our goal is to complete the screening process as quickly as possible while maintaining a safe learning environment for everyone.

Items That Should Never Be Brought to School

The following items are prohibited on campus and may result in disciplinary action and/or law enforcement involvement:

- Weapons of any kind
- Pocket knives
- Firearms or ammunition
- Explosives or fireworks
- Pepper spray or chemical deterrents
- Illegal drugs or controlled substances
- Tobacco products and vape devices
- Alcohol
- Laser pointers used inappropriately
- Any item prohibited by the CMCSS Student Code of Conduct

If you are unsure whether an item is permitted, leave it at home or ask a school administrator before bringing it to campus.

Items That May Slow Screening

Many everyday items contain enough metal to trigger additional screening. While these items are generally permitted, removing them from your backpack before arriving at school can help everyone move through the entrance more quickly.

Examples include:

- Three-ring binders
- Metal lunch containers
- Thermoses
- Metal silverware
- Umbrellas
- Large key rings or excessive keys
- Eyeglass cases
- Cosmetic containers with metal components
- Portable battery packs
- Personal electronic devices that are not required for instruction

If you choose to bring these items, simply be prepared for the possibility of additional screening.

If Additional Screening Is Needed

Occasionally, the OpenGate system will alert and require additional screening.

If this happens:

- Stay with your belongings.
- Follow staff directions.
- Allow staff to complete the screening process.

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- Return items to your backpack after screening.
- Proceed directly to class.

Additional screening is a routine safety procedure. In most cases, the alert is caused by a common household or school item.

What if I accidentally bring a prohibited item?

If you discover that you accidentally brought an item that is not permitted on campus, notify a school administrator immediately. Reporting the situation promptly allows staff to address it safely and appropriately.

Every Hawk Plays a Part

School safety is a shared responsibility. Every student contributes to a positive learning environment by:

- Arriving prepared.
- Following directions from staff.
- Treating others with respect.
- Reporting safety concerns to a trusted adult.
- Helping keep the entrance process moving efficiently.

Working together allows us to spend less time in line and more time learning.

Dress Code

Dress for Success

The Dress Code is designed to ensure the health and safety of students and to avoid distractions to the educational process, while preserving the basic rights of individuals.

The following guidelines must be followed:

1. Attire must not be destructive to school property (i.e., body chains, spikes).
2. Dress must comply with the health and safety codes, regulations, and recommendations of the State of Tennessee and federal health agencies.
3. Dress or appearance must not interfere with the educational process or the rights of others.
 - a. Hats, caps, hoods, bandanas, bonnets, do-rags, and distracting headwear are prohibited inside buildings during school hours.
 - b. Sunglasses are prohibited inside buildings unless prescribed.

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- c. Bare midriffs, see-through garments, undergarment-type shirts, bare backs, halter tops, low-cut blouses and pants, mini-skirts, tank tops, cut-offs, and pajama pants are prohibited.
- d. Shorts, in appropriate lengths and materials, are permitted in grades K-12. No spandex or brief-type shorts are permitted.
- e. Leggings are permissible as long as they are not see-through.
- f. Skirts and dresses must be longer than mid-thigh.
- g. Obscene, profane, provocative, violent, or inflammatory words or pictures on body/skin, clothing or jewelry, or clothing advertising alcoholic beverages, drugs, drug paraphernalia, or tobacco products are prohibited.
- h. Students in grades 6-12 are prohibited from wearing, while on school property or at any school sponsored activity, any type of clothing, apparel, or accessory, which denotes such students' membership in or affiliation with any gang (T.C.A. § 49-6-4215).
- i. Extremely low-riding pants are not allowed because they are a safety hazard. "Sagging" is not permitted.
- j. Body piercings shall not distract from the instructional process.
- k. Jewelry ornaments or accessories which distract from the educational process or which present a safety concern will not be allowed (i.e., grills).
- l. Clothes worn with holes above mid-thigh must have a garment worn beneath them.
- m. Standard footwear including shoes, boots, athletic shoes, and/or sandals must be worn. House shoes or skate shoes will not be allowed.

If there is some question as to the appropriateness of certain apparel, the student should wear something else. Students who come to school dressed inappropriately will not be allowed to class until proper clothing can be secured from home.

Every Minute Matters

Assemblies

All students are expected to remain quiet and attentive while any speaker is addressing the group. Anyone who is on stage, whether a guest of the school, a member of the student body, or a faculty member, must be treated with courtesy. All programs scheduled during the day are a part of the regular curriculum of the school, and all students are expected to attend.

Cafeteria/Lunch

Students may select from a plate lunch or daily specialty bar. Daily lunches for students cost \$2.85. Adult lunches are \$3.75. Please refer to the [CMCSS webpage](#) for more information concerning breakfast/lunch. Students may not leave campus for lunch.

Lunch Expectations

During lunch, students are expected to:

- Follow directions from cafeteria staff and school personnel.
- Remain in their assigned lunch period.
- Stay within designated cafeteria and commons areas.
- Use appropriate language and behavior.
- Help maintain a clean dining environment.
- Return to class promptly when lunch ends.

Lunch is an opportunity to relax and socialize, but students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that reflects positively on Rossview High School. **Lunch is divided into three sessions.**

Respect Our Shared Space

Every Hawk plays a role in keeping the cafeteria clean and welcoming. Before leaving your table:

- Throw away all trash.
- Return trays and utensils to the designated area.
- Wipe up small spills when possible.
- Push your chair back under the table.
- Leave the area ready for the next group of students.

A clean cafeteria is everyone's responsibility. **If you throw food in the cafeteria, you will receive two days of out of school suspension as a consequence.**

Class Schedule

At 7:30 a.m., all students should report to their first period class. Below is the schedule for a standard day.

Snow Schedule

On days when inclement weather makes travel difficult, decisions to close school are made at the district level, not the school level. Parents and students will be notified through the [ParentSquare](#) communication system if school is closed due to inclement weather conditions. All inquiries should be made to 648-5600, **not the school**.

Leaving the Classroom

Students are expected to remain in the classroom during the entire instructional period. No student is permitted to leave the classroom without teacher permission.

Restroom facilities are to be used between class periods. Students will not

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be issued restroom passes during class periods except in emergency situations. Any student who needs to be excused on request from class may do so by presenting a statement to the school office from a physician indicating such a need.

Hall passes are required when leaving the classroom. It is the student's responsibility to secure the necessary signature of the teacher and the hall pass before leaving the classroom.

Only students authorized by the administrators will be permitted to go outside the building during the day. The faculty lounge, snack machines, and parking lot are off limits to students unless given proper authorization.

Lockers

A locker and combination are assigned to students who request them at the beginning of the school year for individual use. Students can request a locker with the registrar in the guidance office. Students are solely responsible for all locker contents. The lockers are property of the school and are subject to search. Students are advised to keep their lockers closed, as the school is not responsible for the contents of lockers or items stolen from them.

Attendance

The Compulsory School Attendance Law in Tennessee (TCA-49-6-3001) requires children (ages 6-17 inclusive) to attend school each day. Students who accumulate five (5) days of unexcused absences will be required to participate in a conference with their parent/legal guardian and may be referred to Juvenile Court according to the CMCSS Progressive Truancy Intervention Plan (STS-P010). The following are official or adequate excuses that should be turned in to the Attendance Secretary in the school office:

- Parents or legal guardians may submit notes for students to be excused up to five (5) days per school year, for any reason.
- Medical note (doctor, dentist, hospital, etc.) for which the student was a patient
- Court note for which the student was required to be in court
- Funeral notice (obituary/funeral program of a family member)
- Military deployment paperwork-for military dependents, TN Law (TCA 49-6-3019) allows the following for out of country deployments:
 - 1 excused absence when the parent leaves for deployment

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- 1 excused absence when the parent returns at the end of deployment
- Up to ten (10) days excused absences when the parent is home from the deployment for Rest and Recuperation
- In addition, local policy allows up to five (5) consecutive days of excused absences (either before or after the deployment) when the parent deployment is less than twelve (12) months
- Military paperwork/documentation **MUST** be provided to the school for these to be excused.

For high school and middle school classes, an absence per class is defined as missing ten (10) or more minutes of the class period. Make-up work: (Including suspension and remandment) Upon the first day of returning to school, it is the student's responsibility to make contact with the teacher(s) regarding make-up work. During the school year, make-up work must be completed within a number of days equal to the number of consecutive days of the absences. A grade of "0" shall be entered into the teacher's grade book for any missing work until the assignments have been completed and turned in. Out-of-school suspensions shall be deemed unexcused absences.

Out of Class Activities

Students participating in school-approved activities will not be counted absent from class.

Tardies

A student who is tardy to first period shall immediately report to the reception desk located in the main office, sign in, pick up an admission slip, and report to class. Additionally, discipline, as specified in the CMCSS Student Code of Conduct, will be administered for tardiness infractions.

In The Office

Deliveries

Students are discouraged from having items dropped off to them at school. Students receiving such items will be notified of the delivery at the end of 7th period. The school **will not accept** deliveries for students from vendors or outside companies, including flowers, balloons, stuffed animals, pizza, or other delivery company meals.

Early Dismissal

All students are required to have a full day scheduled unless they have been scheduled for late arrival or early dismissal. Only seniors are eligible for late arrival or early dismissal and must be on track to graduate.

Students are always required to sign out at the front office (or designated place during mass dismissals) when leaving the building. Students **MUST have a dismissal note** and should observe the following procedures when leaving school before the end of the day:

- Present a signed note from parent/guardian to the receptionist in the main office prior to the beginning of first period. The note should contain the student's name, grade, telephone number, and date. The student should sign out in the main office at the dismissal time (or at the designated place during mass dismissals).
- A parent or person dismissing a student should come to the main office for the dismissal (not required if a note was submitted). The person dismissing a student must be on the student's PowerSchool account for school pickup and have a valid photo identification.

If a student returns to school before the regular dismissal time, he/she should report to the main office and sign in before going to class.

Phone dismissals and/or email dismissals are not allowed due to our inability to identify the person requesting the dismissal.

Students should observe the following procedure when they become ill at school or an emergency occurs:

- The student should inform his/her teacher of the situation. If a student becomes ill between classes, he/she should inform a teacher or other school personnel. Under no circumstances should a student remain in the restroom if he/she becomes ill. Such action will be considered skipping class. After notifying the teacher, the student should report to the school nurse. The nurse will determine whether the student should be sent home. If the student is to go home, the school nurse will contact the parent.

Because parent/guardian contact information (during emergency situations) is used on a routine basis for student dismissal, it is imperative this information be updated routinely.

Medications Taken at School

A licensed health care provider or a medication trained staff member may administer, or the student may self-administer any medication, either prescription or over-the-counter (OTC), if the following specific criteria are met

For Prescription Medication:

1. Written authorization, the form “Authorization for Medications to be Taken During School Hours”, signed by a licensed physician and a parent or guardian, must be on file with the school nurse. It must include the name of the medication, dosage, and time interval medication is to be taken during school hours.
2. Medications must be brought in by a responsible adult in the pharmacy labeled container and turned in to the school nurse. The medication must be counted by the responsible adult and nurse or medication trained staff. Students may not transport medication to and from school, with the exception of emergency rescue medications.
3. Nothing in these statements is intended to prohibit schools from allowing students with specific medical conditions requiring emergency rescue medications from being readily accessible for the self-administration with a licensed prescriber and parental authorization. Proper authorization from the student’s healthcare provider and parent is required. Specific accessible medications/ conditions include inhalers, Epi-pens, Glucagon, diabetic supplies, adrenal insufficiency, pancreatic insufficiency or cystic fibrosis (after development of IHP by a Registered Nurse).

For Non-prescription Medication:

1. Written authorization from the parent must be on file with the school nurse.
2. Parents must specify the name of the over-the-counter medication, dosage, and time interval the medication is to be administered.
3. It is to be brought to school by a responsible adult in the manufacturer’s original labeled container (unopened previously) with the ingredients listed and the child’s name on the container and turned in to the school nurse. Students may not transport medication to and from school, with the exception of emergency rescue medications.

Cell Phones & Personal Technology

Be Present. Be Engaged. Be Ready to Learn.

Students are expected to keep personal electronic devices silenced and stored during the instructional day (**this includes class changes and visits to the restroom**). Use of cell phones and other personal electronic devices during the instructional day (i.e., 7:30am-2:25pm) is prohibited by Tennessee state law.

Personal electronic devices include, but are not limited to:

- Cell phones
- Smart watches used for communication
- Earbuds and headphones
- Tablets not issued or approved by the school
- Gaming devices
- Other personal electronic devices

Students should focus their attention on classroom instruction and avoid unnecessary distractions.

Office phones are available for emergencies only.

During Lunch

Students may use personal electronic devices during their assigned lunch period unless otherwise directed by school staff. Students are expected to use technology responsibly and respectfully while maintaining appropriate behavior in the cafeteria.

Safety & Emergency Procedures

Safety Is Our Shared Responsibility

At Rossview High School, creating a safe, secure, and welcoming learning environment is our highest priority. Every student, staff member, and visitor play a role in maintaining a campus where learning can thrive.

While emergencies are rare, being prepared helps ensure everyone knows what to do if one occurs. Students are expected to remain calm, follow staff directions, and take every safety procedure seriously.

Emergency Drills

Throughout the school year, Rossview High School conducts emergency drills to help students and staff practice responding safely to a variety of situations.

These drills may include:

- **Fire Drills:** Students must leave the building promptly by the prescribed route when the signal is given. Fire drills are serious, and students are expected to evacuate in an orderly manner. Students are to move away from the building as directed by the teacher and remain outside until the return signal is given.
- **Tornado Drills:** During the tornado season, state law requires regular tornado drills. When the signal is given, students are to move quietly to the assigned area in the building and assume the proper position. They are to quietly remain in this position until a signal is given that the drill is completed.
- **Lockdown Drills:** When a lockdown drill is called, students should listen closely to all announcements and instructions given by faculty and staff. Students should remain calm and prepare to defend themselves if necessary.

Students are expected to participate respectfully and follow all instructions during every drill. Practicing these procedures helps prepare our school community to respond quickly and safely if an actual emergency occurs.

During an Emergency

If an emergency occurs:

- Remain calm.
- Listen carefully to staff directions.
- Follow instructions immediately.
- Stay with your assigned class or supervising adult unless directed otherwise.
- Avoid using your cell phone unless instructed, as phone use may interfere with emergency communications.
- Do not leave campus unless authorized by school officials.

Following directions quickly helps protect everyone.

School Resource Officer

Rossview High School is fortunate to have a School Resource Officer (SRO) who works in partnership with school staff to promote safety, build positive relationships with students, and respond to emergencies.

The SRO serves as:

- A law enforcement officer.
- A mentor and resource for students.
- A partner in school safety.
- An educator on topics related to safety and responsible decision-making.

Students are encouraged to seek assistance from the SRO whenever needed.

Reporting Safety Concerns

If you see something that doesn't seem right, say something.

Students should immediately report concerns such as:

- Threats of violence
- Weapons
- Bullying or harassment
- Suspicious behavior
- Unsafe conditions
- Self-harm concerns involving themselves or others

Reports can be made to:

- A teacher
- An administrator
- A school counselor
- The School Resource Officer
- Any trusted staff member

Prompt reporting allows concerns to be addressed before they become larger problems.

Medical Emergencies

If you or another student experiences a medical emergency:

- Notify the nearest staff member immediately.
- Do not attempt to move an injured person unless directed to do so.
- Allow trained personnel to respond.
- Follow staff instructions and help keep the area clear.

Quick communication can make a significant difference during an emergency.

Weather Safety

Tennessee weather can change quickly.

During severe weather:

- Follow staff directions immediately.
- Move promptly to designated shelter areas.
- Remain quiet so instructions can be heard.
- Stay in place until the all-clear is given.

Your cooperation helps keep everyone safe.

We Keep Each Other Safe

A safe school is built on trust, preparation, and teamwork. Every Hawk has a role to play by staying alert, following procedures, and looking out for one another.

When we take safety seriously, we protect not only ourselves but also our classmates, teachers, and visitors. Together, we create a school where everyone can focus on learning with confidence.

Academic Expectations

Excellence Begins in the Classroom

At Rossview High School, we believe every student is capable of learning, growing, and achieving at a high level. Academic success is built through consistent effort, personal responsibility, and a willingness to challenge yourself each day.

Learning is a partnership among students, families, and staff. Together, we create a culture where high expectations are matched with the support students need to succeed.

Advanced Placement Classes

Classes designated Advanced Placement (AP) are taught on a college level and are designed to prepare students to take Advanced Placement Tests, which permit students to receive college credit from many schools, provided their exam score is 3 or higher. Information about these courses may be obtained from the teacher of the class or a school counselor. Teacher approval is necessary for participation in this program.

Education Foundation Academic Awards

To be recognized by the Education Foundation, students must meet the

following criteria:

1. Any 10th, 11th, or 12th grade student with a 93 (with no rounding) or higher average for each of the designated two semesters, with no semester grade lower than an 85. Students working toward a regular diploma are eligible for the award.

Designated semesters:

10th grader - 2nd semester 9th grade

1st semester 10th grade

11th grader - 2nd semester 10th grade

1st semester 11th grade

12th grader - 2nd semester 11th grade

1st semester 12th grade

2. Exchange students are eligible if they meet the criteria.
3. Three-year award winners must have met these criteria for three years and have received this specific award for the two previous years to be eligible for third-year recognition. Transfer students must be enrolled in the Clarksville-Montgomery County School System before the end of the first nine weeks in order to be eligible.

*Students who choose not to participate will not receive this award.

College Admission Requirements

Need to Know Information

School Counseling Services

School counseling services, including personal and educational counseling, information on careers, jobs, vocational schools, etc., are coordinated by the school counselors. Students who want to see a counselor should use the counselor referral section of the student portal (Classlink) to request a visit. Permission from the classroom teacher is required for a student to visit their school counselor during a class period.

Grading System

Clarksville-Montgomery County uses a numerical grading system for reporting student progress to parents. A grade of 60 or above is considered passing. A grade of 59 or below is failing.

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Students may earn up to 105% in Advanced Placement classes.

Students may earn up to 105% in Dual Enrollment classes.

Students may earn up to 103% in Honors classes.

Grade Point Average (GPA)

Senior grade point averages are calculated on seven semesters both numerically and by quality points. The rank in class will be determined from the numerical grade average. Students receiving a Highest Honors Diploma will be ranked first. Students receiving an Honors Diploma will be ranked second, and students receiving a Regular Diploma will be ranked third.

Transcripts

A transcript will be sent to colleges, employers, technical schools, insurance companies, etc. upon student request. There is a \$2.00 fee for printed copies. Transcripts may be obtained from the Registrar or by visiting Classlink portal and searching for the “Student Transcript Request” icon.

Classification of Students

The following earned credits are required for classification:

5 credits to be in the 10th grade

10 credits to be in the 11th grade

15 credits to be in the 12th grade

Credits

For successful completion of a semester course, students must obtain a 60 average to receive credit. All courses are taught on a semester basis.

Students may repeat only semester courses in which the grade earned is below 60.

Schedule Corrections

Schedule corrections are made during the **FIRST 10 DAYS OF SCHOOL** and for the following reasons only:

- A class is missing from the schedule
- Required prerequisite has not been met
- A failed course needs to be repeated
- Course was passed or already repeated
- There is a blank period in the schedule

Students enrolled in AP, Dual, and Honors classes are expected to remain in the selected classes as stipulated in the AP, Dual, or Honors contract.

Make-Up Work

It is the student's responsibility to see the teacher about allowable make-up work upon the day of the student's return to school. Make-up work must be completed within an equal number of days commensurate with the number of consecutive days of absence.

It will be the suspended student's responsibility to see the teacher about missed work upon the day of the student's return to school. Missed work must be completed within an equal number of days commensurate with the number of consecutive days of the suspension.

Report Cards

Student progress is reported to parents every nine weeks of the year. This report contains attendance information in addition to the academic progress in each class. The exact dates for digital distribution of cards will be determined within the school year. Report cards are distributed online by accessing the [CMCSS Parent Self-Service Portal](#).

Semester Examinations

Comprehensive semester examinations will be given in all courses at the end of each semester. Each nine weeks grade will count 40% of the first semester grade. The exam will count 20% of the semester grade. Students enrolled in full-year courses and who make 90% or above during the 3rd and 4th nine weeks grading periods will be exempt from the second semester exam.

During the second semester, classes with no End of Course exam are subject to the same percentages as the first semester. TN Ready assessments will count as a percentage of the students' second semester average.

Textbooks & Computers

Textbooks and computers are required for most classes. Textbooks are loaned to students for the duration of the class. The student must reconcile textbooks that are misused, lost, or damaged. Students will be given the opportunity to check out a laptop to be taken home for use. Please see the school library and/or [CMCSS technology website](#) for all updated policies regarding this. Financial obligations must be submitted before final report cards, transcripts, or diplomas will be issued. Students should deliver money for textbook and/or computer loss or damage to the bookkeeper.

Library and Media Services

The Library and Media Center is available to all students throughout the year. Library hours are from 7:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. each day.

Library materials are available for a two-week check out period by students. In order that as many students may use materials as possible, students are encouraged to return materials in a timely manner. Materials not returned on time will be subject to a fine of \$0.25 per day.

Students are reminded there is no limit to the number of books that can be checked out, and books will not be checked out to a student who has overdue books.

Student Conduct

Character Matters

At Rossview High School, we believe that every student contributes to the culture of our school. The choices we make each day shape our classrooms, our relationships, and our reputation as Hawks.

Our expectation is simple: treat others with respect, take responsibility for your actions, and contribute to a safe, positive learning environment.

Students are expected to follow all school and district policies while demonstrating integrity, courtesy, and good judgment both on and off campus.

Discipline

Students are encouraged to develop self-control, orderliness, and proper consideration for the rights of other people. No student has the right to interfere with the opportunity of any other student to acquire an education.

Each teacher has the authority and responsibility to maintain discipline and should a breach of discipline occur the teacher may:

1. Give warning.
2. Give an extra assignment.
3. Contact the parent and/or school counselor.
4. Refer the student to the appropriate assistant principal.

Students will be referred immediately to an administrator for more serious offenses.

Eligibility rules are set by the TSSAA.

The following is a brief summary of the rules:

1. A student must have earned 5 full credits of class work the preceding school year to be eligible.
2. A student must be carrying at least five full credit courses during the present semester.
3. A student is permitted eight semesters of eligibility beginning with the 9th grade.
4. A student shall be ineligible in high school if he/she becomes 19 years of age on or before August 1.

5. Athletes must live at home with their parents or legal guardians.

In addition to eligibility:

No student can be permitted to try out or participate in practice sessions or athletic contests until there is on file, with the school athletic director, a physical examination signed by a properly licensed Doctor of Medicine and a Parental Consent Certificate signed by a practicing physician and parent or legal guardian certifying the student has passed an adequate physical examination and, in the opinion of the examining physician, the student is physically fit to participate in interscholastic athletics and the student has the consent of parents or legal guardians. Physicals are valid only from April 15 to April 15 of the following year. For more information, please reach out to the school's athletic director. Coaches may set standards above the minimum TSSAA requirements.

Pep Assemblies

Pep assemblies are conducted by the cheerleaders before selected athletic events. Students are expected to move promptly from assigned classes to the gymnasium.

Clubs and Organizations

The administration and faculty recognize the educational benefits derived from participation in extracurricular opportunities and believe student activities are a vital part of the student's educational process. A school's objectives cannot be met solely through the academic courses, and the student activities program is a major means of fulfilling those objectives. An integrated program of curricular areas and areas of student interest maintain this philosophy. The program provides opportunities (in small and large groups) for all students to acquire and practice acceptable social attitudes. It also provides activities in which all students have the opportunity to participate.

Student activities are supervised by a faculty advisor. Some are open to all students; others have criteria for membership. Organizational meetings are held early in the school year to distribute information and recruit members.

HONOR SOCIETIES

INTERNATIONAL THESPIAN SOCIETY: The purpose is to maintain and promote the advancement of the standard of excellence in theater arts. Major productions, class productions, and touring productions are the major activities of this organization. Membership is gained by earning points through participation in theater activities and by being voted into membership.

NATIONAL ENGLISH HONOR SOCIETY: National English Honor Society is a service club devoted to enriching others and providing service in the area of literacy. Seniors are eligible in the fall of their senior year if

they have a 3.5 CGPA and all English grades, 9th through 11th grade, are 85% and above, with exam scores excluded. Students must have been enrolled in honors English or higher for all of their English courses while in high school. Eligible seniors receive an invitation in September. The club often works with elementary students in reading and writing as well as in service with the elderly, veterans organizations, or other community groups.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY: The purpose of this organization is to honor those students that have achieved high standards based on character, scholarship, leadership, and service. Major activities include volunteering and leading within the school and our community. Membership is open to qualified 11th graders through an application and faculty selection process. Application, selection, and induction into the club is during the spring of your Junior year. Students must maintain their qualifications throughout high school to be recognized at graduation and to retain lifetime National Honor Society membership and benefits.

NATIONAL MATH HONOR SOCIETY: This is an honor society run through Mu Alpha Theta. It serves to inspire a keen interest in mathematics, develop strong scholarship in the subject, and promote the enjoyment of mathematics in high school. To be eligible, students must have completed the equivalent of two years of college preparatory mathematics, including algebra and/or geometry, and have completed or are enrolled in a third year of college preparatory mathematics. On the 4-point grading scale, members must have at least a 3.0 math grade point average.

NATIONAL SOCIAL STUDIES HONOR SOCIETY: The National Social Studies Honor Society, also known as Rho Kappa, recognizes high school students who demonstrate academic excellence, leadership, and a strong interest in the social studies. The organization encourages scholarship and promotes an understanding of history, government, economics, geography, psychology, sociology, and other social sciences. The society is welcome to any junior or senior with a 3.5 GPA in all social studies classes taken and who maintain a 3.0 GPA throughout high school. Requirements also include that members take social studies in all 4 years of high school.

NATIONAL TECHNICAL HONOR SOCIETY: National Technical Honor Society is a national honor organization that recognizes outstanding achievement in career and technical education programs. Membership

honors students who demonstrate excellence in academics, leadership, character, and technical skills. NTHS encourages students to pursue higher education and career readiness while promoting service, personal growth, and a commitment to excellence in their chosen technical field.

NJCL LATIN HONOR SOCIETY: This is an honor society run through the National Junior Classical League. At the end of the school year, students are eligible to become Latin Honor Society members if they were members of JCL and maintained A's in Latin class throughout the school year. Members are able to wear honor cords at graduation.

QUILL AND SCROLL: Quill and Scroll is an honor society for students who participate in Journalism during their tenure at Rossview High School. Students who maintain solid academic performance and are active members of the Journalism staffs are invited to join the society.

SCIENCE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY: Science National Honor Society is a prominent scientific organization that will engender a new group of young thinkers who will be the future of industry, research, and scientific exploration for America. The society is open to any junior and senior with a 3.5 GPA in all science classes taken and who maintain that average throughout high school. Sophomores that are in Honors Chemistry are also eligible to join. Requirements also include that members take science in all 4 years of high school.

SPANISH NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY: The Sociedad Honoraria Hispanica is the Spanish National Honor Society, which is organized by the AATSP (American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese) to recognize high school achievement of students in Spanish, to promote interest in Spanish, and to promote interest in Spanish language, culture, traditions, and history both here and abroad. The requirement to be initiated is that students must have earned an A or a B for each of three consecutive semesters in their Spanish classes.

TRI-M: The Tri-M Music Honor Society is the international music honor society that recognizes musical achievement, school and community leadership, outstanding character, and academic excellence. There are more than 2100 chapters worldwide. Tri-M is a program of the National Association for Music Education, the organization dedicated to the advancement of music education. The RHS Chapter is open to music

students who are in their second year of a performing ensemble here at Rossview, by invitation.

CLUBS

ANIMAL WELFARE CLUB: The mission of the Animal Welfare Club is to create an enjoyable environment for students interested in animals and who have passion in interacting with them. This mission is executed through the following objectives: shaping an environment where students can share interests or ideas with other peers, encouraging students to participate in supporting the local animal societies through volunteering, and enriching interests through interactions with animals.

BRING CHANGE TO MIND: BC2M (Bring Change to Mind) is a national mental health awareness organization. It works from the teen perspective and up by providing a platform from which the teen voice, with their opinions and suggestions, is finally heard. This student-led club aims to create a space for educated conversation around mental illness, change perceptions early on, and demystify a topic that affects so many young individuals, either directly through their own experiences or indirectly through a family member's or friend's experiences.

CHESS CLUB: Master the Board! Whether you are a seasoned tournament player or just learning how the knight moves, our Chess Club is the perfect place to sharpen your mind and make new friends. Join us for casual matches and puzzle-solving challenges. We provide a welcoming, supportive environment where you can develop critical thinking, improve your focus, and master the ultimate game of strategy. All grade levels and skill levels are welcome!

CLUB AMERICA: Club America's mission is to educate students about the importance of honoring fiscal responsibility, free markets, and patriotism through innovative campus activism and non-partisan, thought-provoking discussion. Rossview's Club America Chapter wishes to focus the majority of its efforts on spreading patriotism among students and supporting military servicemen, first responders, veterans, and their families within the Clarksville/Fort Campbell region.

CREATE CLUB (SKILLS USA): Create Club at Rossview High School is an open club for any students interested in art, photography, and design

who want to connect with other creatives and share ideas. Members collaborate, explore creative projects, and support one another's artistic growth in a welcoming environment. Create Club also uses student creativity to contribute to the school community through events, displays, and fundraisers that showcase and celebrate student work.

SkillsUSA at Rossview High School is a national Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSO) that helps students develop leadership, teamwork, and career-ready technical skills. Through classroom connections, hands-on projects, competitions, and community involvement, SkillsUSA prepares students for success in college, technical training, and the workforce. Members have opportunities to compete at the local, state, and national levels in areas related to their career pathways while building professionalism, communication skills, and confidence.

DRAMA CLUB: Drama Club is home to all theatre students, both actor and technician, who are eager to produce plays for our school and community. It is made up of a diverse group of talented students who wish to excel in the art of Theatre. Students assist in all aspects of theatre from house crew, set crew, and concessions. All Drama Club members have the option to audition for plays as actors, sound, and lighting technicians, or they may choose to work on crews.

EDUCATORS RISING: Educators Rising strives to inspire and prepare students for professions in education and childcare. Educators Rising performs numerous services for the school and local communities. The members also learn about postsecondary opportunities. Membership is open to all students, Grades 9-12.

FAMILY, CAREER, AND COMMUNITY LEADERS OF AMERICA: FCCLA is a national Career and Technical Student Organization that provides personal growth, leadership development, and career preparation opportunities for students in Family and Consumer Sciences education.

FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN ATHLETES: FCA is a club for Rossview students who want to learn more about God and grow their relationship with Him through fellowship and service in the community. We meet once a month after school and host occasional events throughout the

school year. We are a diverse group of students from all sports and backgrounds who wish to spread love and kindness throughout the school.

FUTURE BUSINESS LEADERS OF AMERICA: FBLA helps high school students prepare for careers in business through academic competitions, leadership development, and educational programs. These competitions give students the opportunity to compete against the best-of-the-best in over 60 academic events that cover technology, public speaking, business, finance, management, and more. Membership is open to students in Grades 9-12.

GAMING GUILD: The Gaming Club provides a positive, inclusive forum for Rossview students to socialize and play together across a variety of gaming interests, including board games, video games, tabletop role-playing games (TTRPGs), and card games. The Guild's purpose is to promote creativity, collaboration, and respectful sportsmanship while introducing members to new gaming experiences and welcoming students of all backgrounds and skill levels. Meetings are held at least once per month, and ideally weekly, with members encouraged to bring their own games and devices to share with fellow gamers. Membership is open to all currently enrolled RHS students who attend at least one scheduled meeting during the academic year.

HAWKS CONSTRUCTION (SKILLS USA): This club is for students who are taking structural system courses. They must pass the OSHA 10 safety course and also make a perfect 100 on the shop safety test. The purpose of the Skills Club is to have a more focused time on projects that benefit the club itself and the community. Students will get more in-depth instruction and a closer look at project management. Select Skills Club members compete in the annual skills competition. This is a great way to grow closer as a construction team and prepare for the future work force. Club dues are \$25.

HOSA: HOSA-Future Health Professionals strives to develop students who value learning, leadership, service, and innovation. Our goal is to empower students to become leaders in the global health community through education, collaboration, and experience. HOSA students have the opportunity to participate in a variety of community-oriented activities and hear from guest speakers in the medical field. Additionally, HOSA students may elect to compete in regional or state knowledge, skill, or presentation

competitions from a variety of health-related fields. Any student with an interest in pursuing a future in any level of medicine can join. Member application forms are ONLY available early August each year along with \$30 member due which covers a shirt and regional, state, and national HOSA membership.

JUNIOR CLASSICAL LEAGUE: JCL is a competitive and engaging academic club for students enrolled in Latin classes. Members study above and beyond the normal class load to compete and win at conventions from the local to national level. They may also enter artistic, creative, and athletic competitions or run for various offices. Every day after school, there is a different subject being studied (taught by other students), and members can come to study as many or as few topics as they choose.

JROTC DRILL AND COLOR GUARD TEAM: The JROTC Drill and Color Guard Team is open to all students enrolled in the JROTC program. It provides leadership opportunities while conducting precision military drills and exhibitions with rifles. The Color Guard presents the National, State, and School Colors at various school and community events. The Drill and Color Guard Team competes at the local, regional, and national level. Practice is held after school.

JROTC FITNESS TEAM: The Fitness Team is open to all students enrolled in the JROTC program. It provides leadership opportunities while training for and competing in physically and mentally demanding competitions that include muscle, endurance, and distance running (1-3 miles). The Fitness Team competes at the local, regional, and national level. Practice is held after school.

JROTC LEADERSHIP AND ACADEMIC BOWL TEAM: The JLAB Team is open to all students enrolled in the JROTC Program. It provides leadership opportunities while training for and competing in academic competition and hands-on leadership teamwork exercises. Membership is based on academic scores and displayed leadership abilities. The JLAB Team competes at the local, regional, and national level. Practice is held after school.

JROTC RAIDER TEAM: The Raider Team is open to all students enrolled in the JROTC program. It provides leadership opportunities while training for and competing in physically and mentally demanding

competitions that include a Physical Fitness Test (Push-ups, Sit-ups, 2-mile run), equipment relays, knot tying, obstacle courses, map reading, rappelling, orienteering, and rope bridges. The Raider Team competes at the local, regional, and national level. Practice is held after school.

JROTC RIFLE TEAM: The JROTC Rifle Team is open to all students enrolled in the JROTC program. It provides leadership and individual opportunities as part of being on a precision rifle team. You must pass a prerequisite safety course with a 100% on the final exam before you can participate. You must qualify and compete for a spot on the team. The Rifle Team competes at the local, regional, and national level. Practice is held after school.

JROTC SABER TEAM: The Saber Team is open to all students enrolled in the JROTC program. It is a non-competitive ceremonial honor guard team that does presentations at multiple school events including the RHS Veterans Day Presentation, RHS Sports Senior Nights, and several other community events. You must qualify for a spot on this team. Practice is held after school.

KEY CLUB: Key Club is a student led service organization that works with the local Kiwanis clubs. Students who are involved in Key Club build leadership skills as they serve their school and community with projects, activities, and volunteerism centered around helping those in need. Every member of Key Club is required to earn 15 hours of community service each semester. The club meets once a month for members to work to complete a service project together.

MATH TEAM: Math Club is designed for students who want an opportunity to attend the APSU Math Team contest in April. Students are given access to previous tests from the APSU competition and work independently and in small groups to solve problems. The club meets once per week. Students are not required to attend every meeting. The club is student driven, with the sponsor serving as a resource.

MULTICULTURAL CLUB: The purpose of the Multicultural Club is to provide opportunities for Rossview students to gain an appreciation of the diversity represented at our school, to provide an outlet for students to develop knowledge and understanding of other cultures, to involve students in the education of other cultures, and to enhance and raise awareness of

cultures within the student body. The club will meet monthly. The due of \$20 will be used to pay for snacks and shirts.

PHOTOGRAPHY/AUDIOVISUAL CLUB: Photography/AV club is an after-school organization for the photography and videography enthusiasts. Students in the club should have access to their own equipment, and professional equipment is not required to be a part of the club. Students will work on different photography and videography skills, participate in critiques and group creations as well as personal work.

ROSSVIEW ROWDIES: The Rossview Rowdies are a student-led spirit organization dedicated to promoting school pride, supporting Rossview athletics and activities, and creating an energetic atmosphere at school events. Rowdies members serve as positive leaders within the student body by encouraging sportsmanship, unity, and school involvement while representing Rossview High School with enthusiasm and pride.

SPEECH AND DEBATE TEAM: Also known as the Forensics Team, students compete at tournaments on Saturdays locally and throughout the state. In Congressional Debate, students write legislation and attend mock student congress sessions. Students may also compete in public speaking, interpretation, and acting categories, as well as in Public Forum Debate. In addition to competition, the team sponsors the popular student talent show and hosts Earth Day celebrations in April. Speech practice begins in early September and is strongly suggested for those who want to be active members, but students may join at any time throughout the year. Freshmen are encouraged to start early so they won't miss out on being a four-year member of the speech team.

YEARBOOK: Yearbook is a chance for students to practice hands-on journalism while preserving all of the memorable moments in a year. Students with a talent or interest in photography, writing, layout design, or business should consider applying for yearbook. Staffers will be selected on the basis of responsibility, grades, and attitude. Yearbook is both a class and an after-school club.

Student Council

The student government is designated as the Associated Student Government (ASG). The purpose of the ASG is to teach citizenship through practice, develop self-discipline and social responsibility, and

promote school spirit. The ASG is composed of a president, vice-president, secretary, class officers, and 12 representatives from each class.

In order to be eligible for office in the ASG a student must meet the following criteria:

1. Be an upcoming senior.
2. Have a 70% or higher for the first nine weeks, second nine weeks, third nine weeks, and semester average in EACH class for the current school year.
3. Submit a petition with the signature of 50 student body supporters.
4. Any candidate running for ASG positions must have at least one year experience on Student Council. All ASG officers must be members of the senior class.
5. Have a teacher recommendation from each current classroom teacher and ASG class advisor.
6. Candidates must have fewer than two discipline referrals during the current school year and may not have been arrested by law enforcement officials.

To be eligible for class officer or representative, a student must:

1. Have a 70% or higher for the first nine weeks, second nine weeks, third nine weeks, and semester average in EACH class for the current school year.
2. Submit a petition with the signatures of 50 class supporters.
3. Have a teacher recommendation from each current classroom teacher and ASG class advisor (if the student has prior service as a class officer or representative).
4. Candidates must have fewer than two discipline referrals during the current school year and may not have been arrested by law enforcement officials.

To continue to participate in student government, elected students must maintain an overall 70% average each grading period, have fewer than two discipline referrals during the current school year, adhere to all the responsibilities for ASG, and may not be arrested by law enforcement officials.

Integrity Defines Excellence

At Rossview High School, excellence is measured by more than grades, awards, or accomplishments. It is demonstrated through honesty, personal responsibility, and the choices we make every day.

Integrity is the foundation of our school community. Whether completing an assignment, taking an assessment, competing in athletics, performing on stage, or representing Rossview in the community, every Hawk is expected to act with honesty and character.

The Rossview High School Honor Code reflects our shared commitment to these values. Students are expected to know, understand, and uphold this commitment throughout their time at Rossview.

Rossview High School Honor Code

Part of the responsibility of education is to develop a strong sense of personal honor, responsibility and ethical principles that extend not only to academics but also to all facets of life. RHS expects every student to refrain from cheating, plagiarizing, lying, and stealing as described below.

- **Cheating:**
 - giving or receiving unauthorized assistance on assignments/tests/projects
 - violating any specific rules/directions given by my teacher
 - **Forgery:**
 - signing another's name on a document
 - **Plagiarizing:**
 - representing another's work as one's own
 - submitting someone else's work as one's own
 - copying something word for word from the Internet or any published source or work of another
 - paraphrasing another's work without crediting the author
 - **Unauthorized Use of AI:**
 - using AI without permission from my teacher
 - **Lying:**
 - intentionally falsifying or denying facts
 - intentionally creating a false impression
 - **Stealing:**
 - taking anything without the consent of the owner
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Consequences of cheating/plagiarizing/unauthorized use of AI:

Student allowed to complete the assignment or alternate assignment, parent contacted, discipline referral sent to the administrator, dismissal from honor societies.

Consequences in AP/Dual Enrollment courses:

Student receives a zero for the assignment, parent contacted, discipline referral sent to the administrator, dismissal from honor societies. If subsequent offenses occur, the student may also be removed from the AP or Dual course and is ineligible to enroll in other AP or Dual courses during that academic year.

Living the Honor Code

Living the Honor Code means making choices that reflect the character of a Rossview Hawk.

Students demonstrate integrity by:

- Completing their own work and giving credit to the ideas of others.
- Being truthful with teachers, classmates, and staff.
- Taking responsibility for their actions.
