Leave 2 blank lines here. Maintain 1.5 line spacing. Set a 0.5" hanging indent to each reference entry and order them alphabetically.

The reference entry should match or correspond to the in-text citation, using the *author-date citation system* in the APA Style. The citation can be found in a table, footnote, figure or appendix. The alphabetical reference list at the end of the thesis should include all the words cited. According to the APA (7th ed., 2020), the reference category (e.g., periodicals, books, websites) and type (e.g., journal articles, magazine articles, blog posts, tweets, Facebook posts) must be identified first in order to adapt the appropriate format. Some examples of reference entries in alphabetical order are presented in the next line.

ISBN and ISSN identifiers are not included in the APA Style references.

The reference examples below are found in Section 10.1 of the APA Publication Manual (7th ed.). Reference types have been added to ensure that you use the correct format. Do not include them in the REFERENCES.
