SOCIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY 2014 ANNUAL REPORT

Community United Church of Christ and the Social Justice Ministry suffered an irrecoverable loss in 2014 with the death of Cyrus B. King. Along with his good wife, Carolyn, who had predeceased him in 2012, the two Kings personified the social gospel thrust of CUCC for decades. Pastors came and pastors went, parishioners came and parishioners went, but Cy and Carolyn remained quiet, personable, and effective bedrocks of progressive advocacy throughout the years since World War II. Their accomplishments are too numerous to list here, but any attentive citizen of Raleigh during the years of their lives is aware of what they contributed to CUCC, Raleigh, the state of North Carolina, and the nation. We shall not see their likes again in this life.

Dr. Mike Soboeiro joined the SJM as its newest member in January. Mike quickly demonstrated his keen awareness of public policy matters and contributed significantly to the SJM's discussions.

With its primary purpose to advocate for and provide financial support to organizations whose missions are to improve the world as they (and we) see it, the SJM placed those entities into general and sometimes overlapping categories.
