

Indianapolis Rowing Center Safety Policy

Emergency Action Plan

Rowers

- * All rowers must have a water proficiency test on file. Tests are valid for 6 years.
- * All rowers must have a current signed waiver of liability on file
- * Minors (under 18) **must** not be on the water without adult supervision
- * Singles are encouraged to use the buddy system whenever possible
- * All rowers must pass a flip test before taking a single out without launch contact the Director of Operations to schedule

Observe Club Rules

- * Utilize the logbook in the boathouse to sign a boat in and out every time
- * Rowers may row from sunrise to sunset -boats must be off the water by sunset (the only exception is for club sanctioned rows with approved boat lighting)

Know The Venue

- * Know and follow posted IRC traffic patterns refer to posted traffic map in boathouse
- * Identify and remember locations of submerged hazards -notify other rowers when possible

Watch The Weather Recommended apps: My Lightning Tracker & Alerts or Weather Bug

- * LIGHTNING: All boats must leave the water immediately if lightning is 15 miles or less from the boathouse
- * WIND: Smaller boats are advised not to row when winds are over 15 mph
- * The water temperature + air temperature minimums: 90 degrees for small boats & 80 degrees for boats with 4+ oars.
- * HIGH TEMPS: Follow the restrictions in the IRC Heat Index Chart, and hydrate generously & frequently. Signs of heat exhaustion include dizziness, headache, muscle cramps & nausea.
- * FOG: If visibility is less than 100 yards, **no boats** shall be permitted to row until the fog lifts

In/On The Boat

- * Check every boat for firmly attached bow ball
- * Visual check of boat must include; fin, riggers, foot stretchers and seat
- * Check for obvious damage/holes – report damage to Director of Operations
- * Use lights when rowing in low light
- * No dogs allowed in launches

Incident On The Water

- * Know distress signals – (calmly) wave arms/shirt in air
- * Stay with the boat! Never attempt to swim to shore. If you are out alone and cannot get back into the boat, swim with your boat to shore
- * When assisting/identifying a boating incident, approach the site into the wind to avoid drifting into the boat or rower
- * Establish verbal contact with those in water and establish injuries if present
- * Rescue first, those who appear to be in the greatest distress
- * Distribute life vests from rescue craft
- * All attempts to bring injured into the launch should occur in pairs and not near the engine
- * Conduct a head count upon arrival to the scene and when leaving
- * If you are on land and see someone in distress, call 911 and contact managers below
- * Complete the incident/accident report form located in the boathouse

Level One Emergency Procedures: (Life Threatening)

1. Call 911
