Work Plan of the Charter Review Committee:

Context about the Committee

The purpose of the Charter Review Committee is to make recommendations to modernize Somerville's Charter ensuring it best reflects Somerville as it is today. This work plan has been designed by identifying key topics that either: (a) must go into a charter *or* (b) are important to the committee to discuss as potential additions to the Charter.

The Committee will approach topics holistically by taking umbrella topics (see **bold** below) and addressing all issues within those broader topics. The order of topics may change as the process unfolds.


Decision Making for the Committee

We will use the fist-to-five voting method on topics and decisions throughout deliberation to gauge the committee's opinions and get a sense of the level of agreement. We will not take a final vote on individual topics until we have gone through all of them.

If needed, with ¾ of the present committee members voting at a 3 or higher (fist to five), the committee may table current discussions and move to the next topic.

At the end of the process, there will be a yay/nay/abstain vote to pass the final report. It will only pass with a supermajority of 8 yays out of 12 votes. Our goal is a unanimous decision so our recommendations are the strongest possible.
