1. How to Answer an Inference Question

What is an Inference?

An inference is an educated guess based on evidence. In history, we use sources to **work out something that is not directly stated**. You need to read between the lines and think about what the source suggests.

How to Structure Your Answer

- 1. **Identify an inference** What can you work out from the source that isn't directly stated?
- 2. Support it with evidence What part of the source suggests this?
- 3. **Explain the significance** Why is this important?

Practice Prompts:

- World War I trench warfare What conditions did soldiers face, and how did they cope?
- Experiences of different soldiers in war How might perspectives differ based on nationality?

☑ Tip: Always include two inferences, each supported with evidence from the source.

2. How to Answer an Interpretation Question

What is an Interpretation?

An interpretation is a historian's opinion about the past. These questions ask you to evaluate how far you agree with a statement or perspective.

How to Structure Your Answer

- 1. **Explain the interpretation** What is the historian arguing?
- 2. Give evidence that supports the interpretation Why might this view be correct?
- 3. Give evidence against the interpretation Why might others disagree?
- 4. Reach a conclusion How far do you agree overall?

Practice Prompts:

- **Turning points in World War II** Was the Battle of Britain the most important moment in the war, or were other events more significant?
- The impact of key military and political decisions How did different choices shape the war's outcome?

✓ Tip: Use phrases like "On the one hand..." and "However, some historians argue..."
to show a balanced argument.

3. How to Identify a Key Feature

What is a Key Feature?


A key feature is an important detail about a historical event, person, or period. When asked to identify a key feature, you must choose something **specific** and explain its importance.

How to Structure Your Answer

- 1. **Identify the key feature** What is an important detail?
- 2. **Describe it briefly** What happened?
- 3. **Explain its importance** Why does it matter?

Practice Prompts:

- What was it like under the Tsar's rule in 1917? What were people concerned about?
- Methods used to control opposition How did the Bolsheviks maintain their authority?

- Practice using sources to spot hidden meanings and key details.
- Use evidence in every answer always support what you say.
- Think like a historian! Ask yourself, Why does this matter? and How does it connect to the bigger picture?
