SOC 205 Week 9: Overview

Introduction

As a global community and within our local communities, we face multiple crises that sometimes appear to have no current solutions. How do we respond? This chapter explores social movements that express solutions, like the set of indigenous movements of food systems, land and resource rights, indigenous knowledge and science witnessed in the IIED workshop.

We'll first describe what social movements are and how they work from multiple theoretical perspectives. Then we'll discuss the environmental crisis from a sociological perspective, and why it calls for social movements. Finally, we'll explore movements that respond to some environmental challenges of our time.
