

Zoom Access for Students

1. Click on the Zoom link that the teacher sent you.
2. The browser will prompt you to download the Zoom app. You can do this, but you don't have to. If you press "Cancel", you will see a small link appear in the window that says "Join from your browser", which you should click.
3. When prompted, enter your name and click "Join."

Zoom Classroom Best Practices

Students should **NOT** create Zoom accounts.

Try to find a location where there will be minimal background noise or visual distraction.

Participants in the call should not be able to see anything in the background of your video that is not school-appropriate or identifies your geographic location.

Wearing headphones with built-in microphones will help lessen background noise and feedback.

If you find that your Zoom is freezing or slow, make sure that there are no other devices streaming on your WiFi, as that can put additional strain on your bandwidth. While turning off your own video stream in the Zoom might also resolve the issue, please make this a last resort as video chats help us build connection & community with one another.

Digital Citizenship: Please begin each video chat or discussion board with a reminder about expectations, such as:

"Although we are in an online environment, please remember that online=offline and our classroom rules and honor code apply. We want to be respectful of one another, take care of our devices and class tools, and let an adult know if something doesn't seem right."
