ABSTRACT

A general introduction to the research topic should be provided, along with a brief summary of the main results and implications. The abstract must be self-contained and readable to a wider audience. It must not contain results not presented in the main text and should not exaggerate the main conclusions. Maximum 250–300 words.

1. Introduction

The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight why it is important, in particular in relation to the current state of research in the field. It should conclude with a brief statement of the aim of the work and a comment about whether that aim was achieved (Author, Year).

2. Materials and Methods

Describe methods in sufficient detail to allow others to replicate and build on the published results. All materials, data, computer code, and protocols must be made available to readers upon publication. Disclose any restrictions on availability at submission stage. New methods and protocols should be described in detail; well-established methods may be briefly described and appropriately cited (Author et al., Year).

Research manuscripts reporting large datasets deposited in a publicly available database should specify the repository and provide accession numbers. Studies requiring ethical approval must list the approving authority and the corresponding ethical approval code.

3. Results

Provide a concise and precise description of the experimental results, their interpretation, and the experimental conclusions that can be drawn.

3.1. Subsection

3.2. Figures, Tables and Schemes

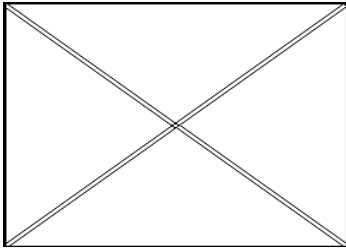


Figure 1. This is a figure. Schemes follow the same formatting.

4. Discussion

Authors should discuss the results and how they can be interpreted from the perspective of previous studies and of the working hypotheses. The findings and their implications should be discussed in the broadest context possible. Future research directions may also be highlighted.

5. Conclusion

This section should clearly explain the main conclusions of the article, highlighting its importance and relevance.

This section is optional but may be added if the discussion is unusually long or complex.

6. Patents

This section is not mandatory but may be added if there are patents resulting from the work reported in this manuscript.

Supplementary Materials

Supplementary material should be uploaded separately at submission. Provide a brief description here if applicable.

In-text citations use the author-date format, e.g., (Smith, 2020) or (Smith & Jones, 2020) or (Smith et al., 2020) for three or more authors. Include the DOI for all references where available. We recommend using a bibliography software package (e.g., Zotero, Mendeley, EndNote) to avoid errors.

Research Article	Original study reporting new findings and significant advancements in foreign language education, applied linguistics, and cross-cultural communication. Priority is given to under-explored issues from a Eurasian perspective.	5,000–8,000 words (including abstract, tables, and references; excluding appendices). Structured sections should include Introduction, Methods, Results, Discussion, and Conclusion.
Review Article	Critical analysis and synthesis of existing research, highlighting current trends, key findings, gaps, and future directions.	2,000 words (including abstract, tables, and references; excluding appendices).
