Employed by the Pierce Arrow Automobile Company in the East during the early days of World War I, he went to France with a shipment of cars. While there, he joined the French Army with which he served until the United States entered the war, at which time he shifted to the United States forces.

Since the end of the war, Mr. Hood, in his 60's at the time of his death, had lived most o' the time in the West, where he was associated with the wood preservation and varnish business. Mrs. Myrtle Hood, his widow, is his lone survivor. Funeral rites are to be held in California.
