# Letter of Recommendation Do's & Don'ts

If you are applying to a 4-year college or university, chances are you will need a letter of recommendation. Here are some do's and don'ts for the recommendation process.

## DO:

- Ask your teacher EARLY, preferably before the end of the school year your Junior year. You definitely want to ask before the end of September Senior year.
- Be polite with your request. Teachers are not required to write letters and they can deny your request.
- Keep track of who you have asked and whether they agreed. Save those emails!
- Invite your teacher on Common App as soon as you create your account (as long as they have already agreed to write your letter)
- Be prepared to give your teacher a copy of your <u>Student Response Form</u>
- Politely remind your teacher about your letter at the beginning of the school year and about two weeks before the letter is due.
- If you change your deadline (deciding to apply early action, for example) make sure your teacher knows.
- Thank your teacher!!! A thank you note would make their day.

## DON'T:

- Wait until the last minute to ask for a recommendation. This stresses you out, and stresses your teacher out. Even if you're not sure where you're applying yet, ask for letters EARLY.
- Add your teacher to Common App before you've asked them for your letter. Have the conversation with your teacher first, make sure they agree, then add them to Common App as a recommender.

- Set your own deadlines. Colleges are very strict with application deadlines for you, but there is a grace period for materials that come from schools. DO NOT set your own deadline for your teacher, especially if you are asking late.
- Pester your teacher about the deadline. It is appropriate to follow up a
  few times, but weekly or daily emails asking about your letter will not be
  well received. If you have serious concerns about missing a deadline,
  reach out to your counselor to help you navigate the situation.
- Enlist your parents to also pester your teacher about the deadline.
   Again, reach out to your counselor for help if you are really worried, and remember: recommenders have a deadline grace period that applicants do not have.

## How many letters do I need?

Two is usually plenty. You will also automatically have a letter from your counselor.

## Who should I ask?

Some colleges specify that they want to hear from a core academic teacher (English, Math, Science or History). If you have a particularly good relationship with an elective teacher, ask them and a core academic teacher.

The teachers you ask should know you fairly well, and it's usually helpful if you did well in their class.

## Can I ask people besides teachers?

Yes, as long as you have at least one letter from a core academic teacher as well. It's not uncommon for students to ask their coaches, youth ministers, or other important adults in their lives for a letter.
