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## Just to Get it Out of the Way, Some Things We Do NOT Have

### **X** We do NOT have government-issued vital records

Official birth certificates, marriage licenses, and death certificates are kept in the office of the city or town clerk where the birth, marriage, or death occurred. Copies are also at the <a href="New York State">New York State</a>
<a href="Department of Health">Department of Health</a>
in Albany. There are no copies in this museum. Please be aware that New York State did not have a vital records law until 1880. Before 1880, researchers usually turn to <a href="church records">church records</a> to seek proof of births, marriages, and deaths.

### **X** We do NOT have an Ancestry-style database of names in our collection

We have over 25,000 books, about 3,000 manuscript collections, plus extensive census, church, and cemetery records on microfilm. Most are undigitized. There is no searchable list of all of the names that appear in these or other items in our library.

## **X** We do NOT have any member-only databases

Every dataset we put online at our <u>Digital Projects</u> page is free to everyone on the internet.

### **X** We do NOT have passenger lists or naturalization records

These are available through LDS Family History Centers, Ancestry.com, FamilySearch.org, and the U.S. National Archives. Some are also in the <u>Grosvenor Room of the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library</u>.

#### **X** We do NOT have school attendance records

These are kept by school districts.

### **X** We do NOT have deeds or property transactions

These are kept at the **Erie County Clerk's Office**.

### We do NOT have patient records from hospitals

These are kept by hospitals. We cannot say for sure, but we suspect that non-current records are routinely discarded.

## **X** We do NOT have wills or estate papers

These are kept by the **Erie County Surrogate Court**.

### Here's What We DO Have: Some Good Places to Start

#### **FRANK** (Find Resources and New Knowledge)

Our online catalog, called FRANK, lists books, pamphlets, theses. and manuscripts in our collection., including biographies, family histories, and how-to books on genealogy. Manuscripts include personal papers of prominent local families, business and institutional records, and scrapbooks. FRANK lists over 30,000 distinct works and collections in our library and we are regularly adding new records. While FRANK cannot search inside books or other items, we are adding links to online versions where available.

#### **Early Settlers Index**

Online at our website, no print version. Names of over 6,000 men and women who lived here prior to 1850 or so, with sources.

#### Newspapers.com

We partnered with Newspapers.com to digitize our Buffalo newspapers. All of our newspapers from 1811-1963, plus the Buffalo News up to the present, are now full-text searchable. You may use Newspapers.com for free in our building. For best results, bring your own laptop. If you live in New York State, you can access it at home through the New York Public Library.

#### Censuses

#### **Federal Census Records,** 1790-1880, 1900-1930 [microfilm]

We have all surviving Federal censuses for Erie County on microfilm. Families are recorded in the order in which the enumerator (census taker) visited them. Legibility varies from page to page. Beginning in 1840, censuses for the City of Buffalo were divided by ward. We have a set of ward maps to help determine which ward your ancestor lived in during a given census year.

Please note that Erie County was not established until 1821. Buffalo and surrounding towns will be found in Niagara County in the 1800-1820 censuses.

#### Federal Census Indexes, 1790-1860

We have print indexes for these census years. These help you locate an individual or family in the census.

New York State Census Records, 1855, 1865, 1875, 1892, 1905, 1915, 1925 [microfilm]

We have all surviving State censuses for Erie County on microfilm. Our only print index is for the towns of Erie County, 1855. The state census is not as informative as the federal census.

We have links to online census records here.

### **Church Records**

We have microfilms of handwritten ledgers from several Buffalo & Erie County churches. These include baptisms, marriages, and deaths. Some also have communion and confirmation dates. Several are in Latin, Polish, or German. Most of these records are on microfilm. Some of the films have been digitized. There is no master index of church records, so we do not know which roll might include your ancestor.

## City Directories

We regret that our directories are too fragile to be scanned or photocopied. Instead, you may photograph them.

**Buffalo City Directories, 1828-2001** 

Also called Polk directories. There are some years when no directory was published, most notably during World War II. Information includes name, address, and occupation. The 1828, 1832 & 1841 directories include Names of Colored People. Starting in 1929, wifes' names appear in parentheses after husbands. Beginning that same year, a geographic section in the back cross-references by street address.

Most of Buffalo's 19th century directories are online here.

Here is a list of the many different directories that we own: business, social, professional, and more. Most are in hard copy only, not online.

## Deaths, Obituaries, and Cemetery Records

#### **Cemetery Records** [mostly microfilm]

We have microfilms of handwritten ledgers from various cemeteries in Erie County. Most are small, rural cemeteries. Pages are usually organized by grave location or number and include name of deceased and date of death. Some records may include person's age at death, or mention of bodies removed to another location. Cemeteries are independently owned and operated, so there is no master list of everyone buried in Erie County's 200 cemeteries & burial grounds.

#### Obituary index, 1811-2001 [card file]

This is our most popular genealogy resource. A card file organized A-Z by surname, with about 99,000 names. Deaths from 1812-1986 are now digitized and online. Modern cards usually include name, age, an occupational note, and a citation to the newspaper where the obituary can be found. If your ancestor is not in this index, a death notice or obituary might still be found by reading newspapers on microfilm for a few weeks after his/her death.

Contains lists of Erie County residents with month and year of their deaths (ca. 1809-1896). Arranged alphabetically by surname; includes will number from county clerk's office, and will/letters of administration numbers from surrogate's court office. A <u>Scholar Pass</u> is needed to use this collection.

#### Farnham, Thomas. Death Record of Old Buffalo Settlers, 1833-1883.

Register of death dates and ages at death of early citizens of Buffalo, N.Y., kept by Farnham from 1833 until shortly before his death in 1883. The volume also contains short biographical sketches of some of these old settlers. The necrologies were published in the Buffalo Commercial Advertiser in 1869 and 1878.

Notes kept by Rev. Eaton on baptisms, marriages, and deaths, 1827-1842, mainly in Buffalo, but also in Paterson, N.J. and Poughkeepsie, N.Y. The volume also serves as an account book, 1823-1843, and includes marriage fees charged by Rev. Eaton. A <u>Scholar Pass</u> is needed to use this collection.

## Military Service

#### **Revolutionary War Veterans in Western NY**

An online list of about 150 names transcribed from a small, handwritten card file giving places of burial, plus a checkmark indicating if we have a photocopy of the veteran's pension file.

#### Williamsville Hospital Records, 1812 [card file]

Organized by regiment, then A-Z by surname, of War of 1812 soldiers who received treatment at the Williamsville Hospital. Includes Connecticut, Kentucky, Maryland, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Vermont, and Virginia regiments, with a separate section for the men who died there.

#### Civil War Enlistees Card Index, Erie County [card file]

The cards are in A-Z order by surname, and include age at enlistment; place of enlistment; rank, unit, date and term of service; and muster-out details (rank, date and location). Cards may also note if the soldier was transferred to another unit, wounded, captured or killed-in-action. Names were drawn from the Annual Reports of the Adjutant-General of the State of New York, 1893-1903.

List of Buffalo and Erie County wounded and prisoners of war, and those killed and missing in action

#### Korean War [card file]

Men from Western New York who served and were missing, wounded, prisoners, or perished.

## **Orphan Home Records**

These directories focused on upper-income families and omitted working-class households and immigrant neighborhoods.

Notes wife's first and maiden name in parentheses after husband's name, and children's names. Includes lists of marriages and deaths. Alphabetical cross-referencing of women's maiden names to married names.

## **Telephone Directories**

Buffalo Telephone Directory, 1880-present, except 1926, 1935, and 1968. Most are brittle and in poor condition. Photocopying is not permitted. You may photograph them. Let us help you reach them.

## **Voter Registration Lists**

These aren't exactly directories but can be used like them. Names of registered voters and their addresses are published in book form, in order by ward or town. Most volumes are very brittle. Photocopying is not permitted. You may photograph them.

Volumes are arranged by town, then by election district within each town, then by street. To find a name, it doesn't take long to read the entire town.
