Learning Outcomes

Upon completing the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Read literature closely for literal and figurative meaning.
- 2. Analyze the ways in which literature is intentional and form shapes meaning.
- 3. Understand literature within its historical, social, economic, and political context.
- 4. Join the scholarly dialogue about literature through acknowledging the ideas of others and situating your ideas within that dialogue both orally and in writing
- 5. Explore the significance of aesthetic reading and writing
- 6. Understand the work of professionals in literature studies
- 7. Understand connections among works across historical time periods

Course Requirements

- Two short papers
- One longer collaborative project & presentation
- One text annotation & presentation
- Class discussion (includes attendance and participation)

Attendance and Participation:

Three key factors to success in this course are preparation (do all readings before class), attendance (be there and be on time) and participation (actively engage in all class activities).

These are my expectations:

1. I expect all students to attend every class, to be on time for class, and to stay for the entire class period. It is a problem when students schedule activities and/or appointments during class time. It is rude to get up and leave class (unless, of course, it is an emergency). Occasionally we must miss class due to unavoidable illness or other mishaps. Missing one class

is not typically a problem. Missing more than one class can affect your grade. Reserve that one absence for very important activities/emergencies.

- 2. I expect students to be prepared for class by having done the reading for the day prior to coming to class and by bringing their textbook to class with them. Your attendance and participation grade includes attendance and all activities completed in class. These may include but are not limited to: quizzes, in-class writing, small group collaboration, and large group discussion. Failure to prepare for class will result in a lowered participation grade.
- 3. The only excused absences for the course are for documented university-related activities. In order to be allowed to make up work that you missed for a university-related activity, I expect that you will supply me with a schedule of your proposed absences ahead of time.
- 4. In addition, I expect students to use class time for class work and focus on the activities in a given class period. This means that students are not texting or engaged in other activities that are not relevant to the class. When you enter class, turn off your cell phone.
- 5. I expect students to handle differences of opinion in class discussion tactfully and with civility.

Grading Policies:

Requirements for the course include reading quizzes, a term paper, two tests and active participation in class discussion and activities. Assignment grades will be weighted as follows:

Text Annotation & Presentation 20 percent
Collaborative Project & Presentation 25 percent
Class Discussion (Attendance & Participation) 15 percent

- Students will present their course projects. (Outcome 2, 5, 7)
