America By the Numbers: PBS Documentary <u>Central Question: How does migration affect people and places?</u>

Background info:

"The fifth episode, "Politics of the New South," welcomes viewers back to Clarkston, Georgia. More than 80,000 refugees have settled in Georgia since the 1980s, and 10,000 of them were placed just outside of Atlanta in the small city of Clarkston. As a result, Clarkston's population went from 97 percent American-born to 53 percent foreign-born. We return to Clarkston to follow unlikely candidates in the city's 2013 local election, as three Mayoral and City Council candidates are former refugees who will be running for office—and voting—for the first time. Will they be able to bring new voters to the polls and make their voices heard? AMERICA BY THE NUMBERS documents this remarkable moment in Clarkston's history.

And if we can get together and solve each other's problems, it'd be a great community"	
4. TED TERRY, MAYORAL CANDIDATE	"There is often this repeated line about immigration that says they're a drain on our services or on our society. The evidence is quite [the opposite] The new Americans get jobs within the first month, two months they're here, completely off government aid within the first year, and they're paying taxes, and contributing to their community"	
5. KITTI AND BILL MURRAY, CLARKSTON RESIDENTS	"I'm voting for all three [of the refugees] partly because of their success stories. In America, we are all immigrants. We need to remember we were once strangers in a foreign land."
