- Fairtrade requires that farmers receive at least a Minimum Price and non-negotiable

  Premium, which is paid on top of the price. We also require longer-term contracts between

  producer organisations and buyers. This gives farmers more security to plan for their own

  futures, as well as those of their children and communities.
- Fairtrade also acts to protect children reported to be involved in child labour within audited supply chains and works directly with farming communities to develop processes to monitor and remediate child labour cases in a way that doesn't shift the practice to other supply chains.
- Fairtrade defines child labour as work that is harmful to a child's health and wellbeing, and/or
  interferes with their education, leisure and development.
- Fairtrade has joined the ILO and the international community in pledging to end child labour.
