Depending on where you live the term First Responder has different meanings.

A person who is among the first to arrive and provide specialized assistance at the scene of an emergency, such as an accident, natural disaster or terrorist attack is considered a first responder. First Responder is an umbrella term that evolved since 9/11, meaning all emergency responders as defined in Section 2 of the Homeland Seurity Act of 2002 (U.S.C. § 101). A certified first responder is one who has received certification to provide pre-hospital care in a certain jurisdiction. A community first responder is a person dispatched to the scene of a medical emergencies until an ambulance arrives.

Law Enforcement First Responders are responsible for stopping an emergency from progressing to a higher threat level. This means that the first officers to arrive on a scene need to be able to quickly assess the situation to determine what other assistance may be needed, neutralize any threats and maintain a safe scene until medical personnel arrive. Law Enforcement First Responders provide initial rescue or first aid care. Unless you are an EMT, you save more advanced medical care for when the ambulance arrives. In other words, a police officer may provide CPR to an accident victim, but they must stop when the more qualified medical first responder can take over.




