## **Umpire Briefing Notes**

- 1 If you wish to protest **including for rule 42** 
  - Hail 'Protest' at once and loudly (for the umpire as well as your opponent)
  - Show a red flag (<u>to the umpire</u> as well as your opponent) and make eye-contact
- 2 If you intend to take a penalty
  - it helps to tell the umpire loudly 'spinning'
  - acknowledge by raising an arm
  - get clear asap
  - take one turn (check which tack you started on)
- 3 If no-one takes a penalty the umpire will make a decision
  - green no rule broken (or could not see)
  - red two turns (check which tack you started on)
  - if both boats broke a rule and only one takes a penalty the umpire **may** penalise the other
- 4 If the correct flag and hail procedure is not followed, the umpire will not respond.
- 5 Umpire initiated penalties (i.e. two turns)
  - rule 31 hitting a mark (but not its flag)
  - rule 42 illegal propulsion
  - rule 14 contact between team-mates
  - rule 44 incomplete umpire awarded penalties (check your own voluntary penalties and protest again if you need to)
  - when a penalty still leaves the culprit's team advantaged (this could bring a black flag instead)
  - rule 2 fair sailing e.g. for bullying, for instance constant shouting and harassment note, too many unfounded shouts of protest can mean the umpires can't keep up with flags and hails and may miss a genuine incident.
- After the race if there is time the umpire will explain what they saw. There may not be time. Ask on shore
- 7 Do not hit each other
  - You are unlikely to get redress for most breakdowns so keep sailing; follow the rule to claim
- Please be aware of racing boats when you go to change-over. Don't sail between the umpire and the race!
- If you're interested in becoming an umpire, remember there are RYA bursaries to assist young people (under 35) and women of any age to become qualified; if your parents used to team race, tell them they would be welcome in umpire boats if they would like to give it a try!
- 10 There's usually room for others in the umpire boats —if you want to come out, ask.
- NB Tape shrouds you've been warned so no redress if you lose your mast.
