

## Citing Websites

### Works Cited Entry (7th edition)

Here is the information you should try to find on your website to cite it in MLA style. Not every Web page will provide all of the following information. However, collect as much of the following information as possible:

Required Information & Order	Format for Works Cited	If None
Author(s) or editor(s) name Two authors Three authors Four or more authors	Last name, First name. Last, First, and First Last. Last, First, First Last, and First Last. Last, First et al.	Leave blank
Article title	“Title in Quotes and Title Case.”	Leave blank
Website name	<i>Website in Italics.</i>	Leave blank
Publisher/sponsor name	Publisher,	n.p.,
Date of publication	20 May 2013.	n.d.
Medium of publication	Web.	--
Date you accessed the site	25 Feb. 2017.	--

When you put all the information together, it should look something like the following. Don't forget punctuation.

Last name, First name. “Title.” <i>Website</i> . Publisher, 20 Mar. 2013. Web. 25 Feb. 2017.
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### Parenthetical or In-text Citation

In MLA style, referring to the works of others *in* your text is done by using what is known as a parenthetical citation. This method involves placing relevant source information in parentheses after evidence. Any source information that you provide in-text must correspond to the source information on the Works Cited page. More specifically, whatever signal word or phrase you provide to your readers in the text, must be the *first thing* that appears at the left-hand margin of the corresponding entry in the Works Cited list. For many sources, this is the author's last name. If your source does not have an author, you would use the article title. While print sources also require a page number, most websites do not have page numbers, so you are not required to provide any.

Basic Types	How to Parenthetically Cite	Example
One author	Last name	(Last name #)
No author	Title in quotation marks	(“Title” #)
Two or three authors	Last names joined by “and”	(Last and Last #) (Last, Last, and Last #)
Four or more authors	Last name followed by “et al.”	(Last et al. #)
Authors with same name	First initial and last name	(M. Last #) (W. Last #)
Author with multiple works	Last name comma title in quotes	(Last, “Title1” #) (Last, “Title2” #)
