Digital Ethnography Methods: A week of Fieldwork + Analysis of Human/Non-human Entanglements.

A PhD Summer School

Hosted by Digital Ethnography Research Centre, RMIT University February 20-24, 2023 RMIT University's City Campus, Melbourne, Australia

(5 days of lectures, discussions, workshops, fieldwork, guided analysis workshops, presentations of in-progress insights, a plenary/keynote session followed by a reception, and a group dinner out on the town)

Description

This PhD summer school introduces participants to core as well as innovative ethnographic frameworks and methods for observation, engagement, documentation, and analysis.

Digital transformations and technologies have potentially profound impacts on people but can be challenging to observe because they have varying degrees of visibility and invisibility. How might we attune playful, creative and critical methods that acknowledge complex layerings of visible and invisible technologies and histories? What techniques help researchers get at the granularity of sensory, material, social and digital overlays and practices, when any situation of focus will involve multiple human, non-human, and more than human participants?

Two field sites have been selected for participants to engage in field exercises with world-leading experts from the Digital Ethnography Research Centre. Both sites offer distinctive complexities of fieldwork in mixed/hybrid digital- and data-saturated contexts.

In class lectures, workshops, and fieldwork provide guidance and training in core methods and tools. In addition, over the course of this program, participants gain insights and experience in: using best practices to confront ethical challenges on a case-by-case basis, making sure the tools fit the contexts or research questions, dealing with both too much and not enough material, building interpretations that have strong credibility through reflexive practices, conducting ethnographic analysis in small teams, and presenting 'in progress' findings to stakeholders.

The course invites 30 students to participate in 5 days of classroom and field site experiences:

- Lectures focused on innovative research design and creative fieldwork techniques
- Guided field activities in teams,
- Keynote lectures by world-class digital ethnographers,
- Optional symposium for participants to present research
- hands-on fieldwork of two distinctive hybrid human/non-human/more-than-human contexts in Melbourne
- Workshops on analytical techniques of situational mapping and critical making
- Presentations and feedback

This is an intensive and immersive PhD summer school designed to introduce PhD students to core concepts of digital ethnography and give students hands-on practice with some advanced and specialized techniques to study experiences and practices in particular places, as these are entangled with physical, digital, personal and social factors. One involves living labs in defined public spaces. The other is a distributed practice of interacting with human and more than human entities.

Students at any stage of their PhD will benefit from this immersive Summer School. Students do not need any prior experience in ethnography, digital ethnography, or fieldwork to participate.
