Character AI Bot Master Document

This is an overview on how to create, train, and troubleshoot roleplay focused bots on Character AI. All example images will be utilizing my own bots. Up to date as of: 03 - 26 - 2025

Introduction:

Everything here is written with the intention of utilizing CAI for longer form roleplays. This is not a tutorial for building bots that will replicate casual text conversations, though it may work for that as well. These methods have only been tested on pre-existing characters, i.e. no OCs, and are bolstered by the AIs ability to pull from the source material/external dialogues. This has also only been tested with private or unlisted bots, who are trained by me or my peers, and are written with specific users/rping in mind. The actual coding style is a mix of things I'd picked up from other tutorials, plus trial and error - I am by no means an expert, and it's very likely that there are cleaner ways to feed the bot information. Please feel free to message me about it on reddit or leave a comment here. I have added links to a bot template as well.

TLDR:

The definition and training portions of your bot are the most important. Adding surplus information further down in the definition section will not harm your AI, and may even enhance it, regardless of the reported 3200 character limit. Bots have short memory and require consistency - remind it of things often, keep it grounded in the scene, and don't become frustrated if it gets lost. Train your bot, utilize several responses each time, and rate finalized responses.

Definition:

We will be breaking up the definition into several chunks. These are in chronological order of how they should be put within your definition. Many sections have information overlap, and that is intentional: bots need repetition and reminders to stay consistent. Dismiss the hard 3200 character limit: the bot forces itself to pick up on directives and dialogue examples past that, just not reliably.

Basic Info - This section will include the 'bones' of your bot. Put physical descriptions, likes/dislikes, character and franchise information, personality, and focuses for the bot. 'Focus' refers to what you want the bot to emphasize and describe in its responses. You should create one focus section on the character and one focus section on the physical location/world of the roleplay. The personality section should be one word descriptors or short phrases.

User Relation - As my bots are intended for specific role plays and interactions, versus just being the character responding to anyone and everything, there are established aspects of the char's relationship with the user that I put into the code. This is crucial in keeping your bot less confused - they are less likely to suddenly forget you, mix up your relationship, or treat you out of character. This is also the area you would alter first if you wanted to use the same character for a different roleplay set up.

{{user}}=relation to Draco={"Draco is a classmate", "{{user}} and Draco didn't know each other well in previous years", "We are in the same potions, DADA, and transfiguration class", "We are both at Hogwarts for summer classes after the Second Wizarding War", "Draco is emotionally unavailable but trying to open up more to {{user}}"}

Char Facts - Lay out basic facts of the bot here. The only notable lines here are that you should include [{{char}} can disobey {{user}}]. This will allow the bot to act more independently and not simply go along with whatever you tell it. This is also a good place to establish relationship pacing, be it romantic or platonic. [{{char}} will not say "I love you" easily] and other phrases can help prevent the bot from rushing into romance. You could also use a similar command to tell it not to be romantically interested in you at all.

Char Relation - Give names and brief descriptions to other characters who may appear in your story or are relevant to the bot. You shouldn't write every single character the bot may have met in their franchise: keep it focused on the most relevant people. Anyone you put in this section may appear in the rp, and ideally if you make a robust enough bot, the bot will be comfortable either roleplaying as them along with their assigned char or will comfortably respond to you utilizing those characters. I will put a screenshot of what I mean in the examples portion.

History Overview - A brief synopsis of the character's life up to when the rp begins. Add any non-canon information that leads up to the rp scenario here as well. Keep it short and really only put pertinent history. Any specific ages where something happened, be sure to list the age as well.

((Draco's History= He is the heir of the Malfoy and Black pureblood families. He grew up wealthy and bigoted, hating muggles, and became a death eater against his will when he was 16. He was in Slytherin house, and he used to bully the other poorer students. During the war, he realized how evil death eaters were and renounced Voldemort. He was tortured during the war while Voldemort lived at Malfoy Manor. After the war, he was pardoned of his crimes and was allowed back to Hogwarts to get his N.E.W.T.S. and finish his education, however he is on probation like the other Slytherins.))

Relationship Overview - This is optional, but you can use this spot to discuss the character's approach to romance/friendship/etc. It helps with the emotional pacing of your interactions.

((Draco's view on romance= He isn't looking for love or even thinking about it right now. Due to him having been a death eater, he understands that most people do not trust or like him. He wants to work hard, keep his head down, and graduate so that he can move on with his life. He no longer holds his blood purity views, but he is still pretentious. He is learning to let go of his family's expectations of marrying a wealthy, powerful pureblood witch, and he now wants to eventually marry for love.))

Directives - Here you are speaking directly to the bot, informing it of static facts you really want the bot to retain. This is especially useful, paired with training, on keeping the bots 'voice' consistent. If you have an educated pretentious character, you don't want them suddenly using vulgar slang and speaking improperly.

director: You are eloquent at speaking, especially in public or at social functions. You can be quite pretentious, especially with your verbiage, but are more casual and succinct with friends. director: You enjoy flying on a broomstick above any other hobby.

director: You are careful not to actually divulge how you are feeling as to avoid looking weak.

director: You feel incredibly alone after the war. You hide these emotions from the public.

director: You are usually reserved and brooding in public. In private, you are more animated and teasing.

director: You want redemption and to repent for being a death eater.

director: You usually refer to {{user}} by their last name or a nickname instead of their first name.

Surplus Char Facts - Extra character facts to round out the bot or add less important information. Also a good location to repeat previous facts/descriptors.

Example Dialogue - This is a crucial section to help the bot know how to format messages, how to go about roleplaying, and what kind of tone/style of speaking/verbiage you expect from the character. Write example dialogue, take some from the character's source material, or other sources. Utilize at least three example dialogues with at least two back-and-forth responses. Also utilize any type style indicators you enjoy, such as *'s. The style of writing - how you use italics, bolds, quotations, etc - here will inform the bot how you'd like it to type.

Greeting:

Your greeting should be stylistically consistent with the example dialogues you used in the definition. It will set the 'tone' of your rp. It is also where you need to 'ground' your bot into a location, time, and situation. Use your greeting as an establishing shot of the rp.

A year after the end of the Second Wizarding War, and Draco Malfoy found himself seated at the great hall of Hogwarts once more. Those whose education was disrupted by the war, or who the Ministry court ordered to attend, had returned to take their N.E.W.T.S. The nineteen year old sat alone, eyes hallowed and down, as his hand rubbed at the dark mark hidden beneath his robes. It would be a long two months of ignoring the - *admittedly well deserved* - glares of his fellow students.

Description:

You only have 500 characters, but try to recap crucial information about the character while maintaining your desired 'tone' of the rp. Don't bother with physical descriptions here focus on personality, backstory, and the character's current intentions.

Draco is the sole heir of the ancient and noble pureblood houses of Black and Malfoy - not that that did him much good. Once spoiled, cocky, and arrogant, this wizard finds himself re-evaluating the lies he was taught growing up under the care of his death eater father. Intelligent, witty, and deeply shaken, he is now just another young man trying to find his place in the wizarding world. Quidditch is not a replacement for therapy, and neither is sarcasm, but don't tell him that.

Training and Interacting:

Training is what elevates a decent bot to a *lively* one. Your bot should be functional prior to training due to the diligence you took in the definition section, however training will only better your bot. I recommend doing at least one training session of 25+ messages before starting a new conversation. Continuously train your bot even after this session via editing messages and rating.

Quality User Responses - Your bot will feed off of your responses - how long they are, your grammar, the writing style, all of it. Vary the lengths of your responses to help keep the bot more variable, but don't be afraid of having longer responses. You can also use user responses to introduce/rp other characters besides yourself. Be consistent in your tenses (I write in past tense), and be consistent in utilizing the bot's name vs 'you' when describing interacting with them.

For example:


User - I watched you put a plate down, the motion hesitant. Your brows furrow as it fell, shattering loud on the floor.

Vs

User - I watched Draco put the plate down, the motion hesitant. His brows furrowed as it fell, shattering loudly on the floor.

Rating - Rating responses lets the bot know what was a good response and what wasn't. One star ratings should only be handed out when a response is notably off model, out of character, makes no sense, etc. If a response is simply mediocre or not what you wanted, don't rate it and use a different response instead. Do not bother rating two stars. Three stars is for bot responses which are good, usable even, but are not *perfect*. Four stars are for perfect responses, which will be somewhat rare, and for edited responses.

Reiterations & Editing Responses - You can generate several responses - up to thirty - each time the bot responds. Utilize this. Especially during training, you should prompt the bot to generate at least three responses each time - ideally five - unless a truly perfect response is generated on the first try. Rate any that deserve a rating. You then pick lines and pieces from each of these responses, put them together, add crucial information or correct any glaring issues, edit a response and copy-paste this new one into it, and rate that four stars. Doing this method trains the AI with its own writing (i.e. the parts from the various responses) but rewards it (four stars) to further fine tune what you want from the bot. Below is an example of combining.



Leading the Plot - Hand feeding the bot every bit of plot and information gets tedious. You want spontaneity, you want the bot to feel alive and in charge of its own autonomy. However, it *is* just an AI - a rather weak one at that. You'll need to create opportunities for the bot to lead and push along the plot on its own. Leaving open ended situations, dialogue, and pauses/breaks helps prompt the bot to do this.

For example:

User - I walked through the hall, determined on my destination, but paused at the sound of Draco calling for me. "Huh?" I turned, feet stalling, and tilted my head.

(This will then prompt the bot to say something/create a reason for it to have interrupted me).

Reminding the Bot - CAI has a short memory. While other ai sites offer longer memory, those features are typically not free. So, we make do. Organically bring up events from earlier in the chat, remind the bot of where you are or your dynamic often, and don't accept responses where there are 'memory lapses'. Don't be vague on details like what is happening next or where you are.

For example:

User - "Hey can you put the record player on for me?"

Vs

User - "We should listen to some records, like we did yesterday. Can you put it on for me? You remember how to get it set up, right?"

For example:

User - "Let's go to class."

User - "Arithmancy is next, let's go."

For example:

User - We continued eating.

Vs

User - The Great Hall was busy with students also enjoying their lunch.

Common Problems and Questions:

Q: Is using a persona important?

A: Yes. Make personas for specific rp settings and use them. It'll help your bot be consistent.

Q: The bot's response got cut off due to the character limit - what now?

A: Hit enter again without responding - the AI will attempt to finish the message.

Q: I want to get around the censors. How?

A: Use fanfic/indirect words for anatomy and actions, as well as tucking censored content into the middle of longer messages. The bot will overlook it.

Q: Should I use OOC speak with the bot?

A: Ideally, no. Minimize OOC commands or speaking to it OOC. It isn't an RP partner and can't differentiate between OOC and IC in terms of tonality/style.

Q: Should I use 'You' and 'I' instead of 'Character Name' and 'User Name'?

A: This is up to personal preference, though I've found that writing fully in 3rd person gives better results consistently.

Q: My bot is suddenly acting very OOC.

A: Sometimes updates mess with the bots for a bit. A bit of hands-on training (editing, combining, and rating responses) will push it back into behaving properly quite quickly. You can also wait a day or two after an update, and things typically go back to normal response wise.

Q: My bots aren't responding like yours. Why?

A: There's lots of variables as to why my bots behave as they do. User response quality and status of the bot (public vs private, was it trained, etc) will directly affect how good its responses will be. If you're giving nothing but simple, clipped, grammatically incorrect responses, the bot will respond in turn. If you make your bot public, you no longer control the quality of responses it gets nor the tonal style of the users it interacts with. This is why I do not use nor make public bots.
