Launching our Big Ranunculus Watch

Thank you to everyone who responded to our last email by sending old photos of the Wye brimming with water crowfoot. These collective memories are vital. It's so powerful to understand what we've lost, but also to help us envision what we could have again.

So, we want to make this bigger! We've set up a [google form](#) so you can submit your images of ranunculus in the Wye. Please could you search through your photo albums and look out for the fronds and flowers in the river? If you find any images, we'd love you to share them with us, telling us where each picture was taken and when. We want to map the ranunculus across the catchment through time.

We're also eager to track where there's ranunculus now, so we can better understand what factors may help determine its recovery. If you see ranunculus in the Wye catchment, please take a photo and let us know via the form.

We're so grateful to all of our citizen scientists who already report sightings of this river plant - and we'd love the support of the wider community to expand our knowledge. Please can you share this request with your friends, neighbours and colleagues in the catchment? The more photos we get, past and present, the richer our understanding will be.

It was also uplifting to hear from students at Haberdashers School about their positive experiences getting involved with river testing.

Thanks to Save the Wye for organising the Riversong event in Ross. It was a joy to hear the climate choirs singing by the river, in the presence of the Goddess, and many powerful new connections were forged. The Hay Festival helped entice some famous faces to the shores of the Wye to aid us in our struggle for clean rivers. We had the opportunity to spend a few hours with Robert Macfarlane, before he went on stage to discuss his new book *Is a River Alive?*

Funding from the National Lottery

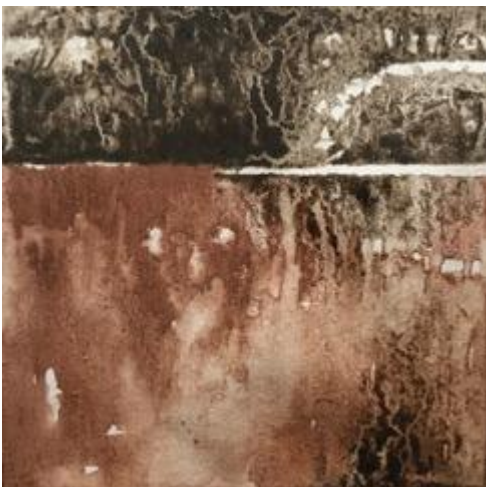
