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Abstract

The abstract should be in one paragraph. The font is Calisto MT, 11 pt, and justify. Abstract is in 200-300 words, which is followed by 3-5 keywords.

Background: (i) Briefly identify the research problem; (ii) Highlight the research gap in previous studies; (iii) Avoid theoretical explanations or citations. Identify the research problem at hand and explain why the problem is important to study. **Objectives:** State the research objectives clearly and in detail. **Methods:** (i) Describe the research design; (ii) Mention participants or samples; (iii) Include instruments and data analysis briefly. **Finding/Results:** (i) Present key findings; (ii) Include specific data or statistical results when relevant. **Conclusion:** (i) State the main conclusion; (ii) Explain the implication or contribution of the research; (iii) Briefly state the main limitation of the study (e.g., sample size, scope, methodology). (iv) Provide one sentence suggesting what future researchers can explore to improve or extend the study.

1. Introduction

The introduction should concisely position the study within a broader context and explain its importance. It needs to clearly state the purpose of the work and its relevance. A thorough review of the current state of the research area should be presented, supported by citations of key publications. When appropriate, address any conflicting or differing hypotheses. The introduction should also briefly outline the main objective of the study and emphasize the core conclusions. Ensure that the introduction remains accessible to readers from outside the specific research discipline. References must be numbered according to their order of appearance and cited using square brackets—for example, [1], [2,3], or [4–6]. Further details on reference formatting can be found at the end of this document.

2. Materials and Methods

The Materials and Methods section should provide sufficient detail to enable other researchers to replicate the study and build upon the published findings. Please note that submitting your manuscript implies a commitment to make all materials, data, computer code, and protocols related to the publication accessible to readers. Any limitations on the availability of materials or information must be disclosed at the submission stage. New methods and protocols should be described comprehensively, while established methods may be outlined briefly and supported by appropriate citations.

For research manuscripts presenting large datasets deposited in publicly accessible databases, authors should indicate the repository used and provide the corresponding accession numbers. If accession numbers are not yet available at the time of submission, state that they will be supplied during the review process; they must be provided before publication.

Intervention studies involving humans or animals, as well as any research requiring ethical approval, must identify the approving authority and include the relevant ethics approval code. Where applicable, authors must also disclose how generative artificial intelligence (GenAI) was used in the preparation of the manuscript—whether for generating text, data, graphics, or supporting study design, data collection, analysis, or interpretation. The use of GenAI for minor text editing (such as grammar, spelling, punctuation, or formatting) does not require disclosure.

3. Results

This section may be organized using subheadings when appropriate. It should present a clear and concise description of the experimental results, their interpretation, and the conclusions that can be derived from them.

The text following an equation need not be a new paragraph. Please punctuate equations as regular text.

Theorem-type environments (including propositions, lemmas, corollaries etc.) can be formatted as follows:

Theorem 1. Example text of a theorem. Theorems, propositions, lemmas, etc. should be numbered sequentially (i.e., Proposition 2 follows Theorem 1). Examples or Remarks use the same formatting, but should be numbered separately, so a document may contain Theorem 1, Remark 1 and Example 1. The text continues here. Proof must be formatted as follows:

Proof of Theorem 1. Text of the proof. Note that the phrase “of Theorem 1” is optional if it is clear which theorem is being referred to. Always finish a proof with the following symbol

5. Conclusions

This section is optional but may be included in the manuscript when the discussion is particularly lengthy or complex.
