Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT)

Description/Rationale/Benefit(s) to Students

The SAT is a globally recognized, primarily multiple choice test that has been used in the past by colleges and universities as one data point to consider in the admissions process as well as for qualifying for scholarships. In the past few years, there has been an increase in the number of schools who have made test scores optional for admissions.

The SAT is developed by the College Board, the same organization that is responsible for the PSAT, AP and CLEP tests and is constructed in the same way as the PSAT including sections on reading, writing and language and mathematics. The scoring is slightly different than the PSAT as each of the SAT section scores, Evidenced Based Reading and Writing and Mathematics, is on a scale of 200-800.

Administration Time	A little over 2 hours
Cost to family/Fee waivers (subject to change)	\$68 per exam; fee waivers are available
Accommodations/How to Qualify	Available; Family provides written permission to the school to share information with College Board. It is recommended that this occur during the annual review in ninth grade or earlier that year. Once College Board has approved accommodations for a student, the student can continue to use those approved

Results - Timing/Access	<p>Students can access their scores 2 - 3 weeks after the test and will need a College Board online account. Each student should have only ONE College Board account. More information about accessing scores is available here.</p>
