Hey there!

Thank you for your interest in joining our letter writing party, *Justice Sans-Forme*, on June 19th from 6 to 7:30 p.m. EST. We're grateful and excited to celebrate Juneeteenth with you! Juneteenth is an American holiday in honor of when Texas - the last rebel state - officially abolished slavery (1865). 2020 marks the 155th anniversary.

Before we all meet, here is some background information for context:

A well-written *personalized* letter may be the most effective way to communicate with government officials. The purpose of a letter-writing party is to take advantage of the opportunity to gather with like-minded individuals to be even more effective in working toward your goal. With our event, you will be able to ask important questions, make connections with others who hold similar human-rights values, and will be provided with inspiration and direction for writing your own letter to incite change from your local legislatures.

BEFORE THE CALL

Things you should know:

- 1. When you join the Zoom call on Friday, your microphone will be **muted.** Please introduce yourself by typing your name and location in the chat.
- 2. If you have any questions during the featured presentation, you may also type them in the chat. Councilman Craig Epps will have a question and answer session, but due to time constrictions, not all of them may be addressed. We will do our best to get to yours!
- 3. DJ Luna Rosa will host a cocktail hour with live music, immediately following the Q+A session. Feel free to utilize this time to grab a pen and paper (and maybe a drink) and begin creating your own letter to local legislatures. Please take breaks as needed, but be aware that programming will be running without any formal breaks.

DURING THE CALL

Letter Writing Tips:

- 1. Text "resist" to 50409 or visit <u>Democracy.io</u> from your web browser to get started. Follow the prompts provided to you by each service.
- 2. If you are mailing a physical letter, be sure to include your name and address on both your letter and envelope. Dear (Assembly Member / Senator) (last name). Be courteous and informative in your communication. State the purpose of the letter in the opening sentence and if you are referring to a bill, include the bill number, author and topic. Here is a letter template.
- 3. <u>Keep it brief:</u> Letters should never be longer than one page, and should be limited to one issue. Legislative aides read many letters on many issues in a day, so your letter should be as concise as possible.
- 4. <u>State Who You Are and What You Want Up Front</u>: In the first paragraph, tell your legislators that you are a constituent and identify the issue about which you are writing. If your letter pertains to a specific piece of legislation, it helps to identify it by its bill number (e.g. H.R. ____ or S. ____).
- 5. <u>Hit your three most important points:</u> Choose the three strongest points that will be most effective in persuading legislators to support your position and flesh them out.
- 6. <u>Personalize your letter:</u> Tell your elected official why this legislation matters in his community or state. If you have one, include a personal story that shows how this issue affects you and your family. A constituent's personal stories can be very persuasive as your legislator shapes his or her position.
- 7. <u>Personalize your relationship:</u> Have you ever voted for this elected official? Have you ever contributed time or money to his or her campaign? Are you familiar with her through any business or personal relationship? If so, tell your elected official or his staff person. The closer your legislator feels to you, the more powerful your argument is likely to be.
- 8. <u>You are the Expert:</u> Remember that your legislator's job is to represent you. You should be courteous and to the point, but don't be afraid to take a firm position. Remember that often your elected official may know no more about a given issue than you do.

Dear Sen. Robert Menendez; Rep. Donald Payne; Sen. Cory Booker,

I implore you to urge every Chief of Police at every police department in every township/city in every county throughout the entire state of New Jersey to take the pledge to enact the #8CantWait Use of Force policies.

As a young, Black woman in my mid-20s who frequents dance socials far from home, I fear the drive back consistently- I fear being pulled over because as a young, Black woman in my mid-twenties, that stop could be the beginning of my end. I instinctively spend a large majority of my drive, scouting my surroundings instead of confidently paying full attention to the road. The last time I was pulled over for running a red light that wasn't red, I called my mother on the phone before I even produced my license and insurance. I needed to know that if bullets were to fire at me or my body was legally sexually violated, that my mother would hear me scream. That someone on my side had some semblance of truth on the matter. As a young, Black woman in my mid-20s in America, my truth is constantly at risk. I do not deserve that. I deserve nights out at dance socials far from home as a young, care-free Black woman in my mid-20s.

The #8CantWait policies are simple, common-sense and would make our community safer. Can you commit to enacting these additional policies right now?

- Ban Chokeholds & Strangleholds
- Require De-escalation
- Require Exhaust All Alternatives Before Shooting
- Ban shooting at moving vehicles
- Require Use Of Force Continuum
- Require Comprehensive Reporting
