EXPECT

To believe that something will happen, for example, because it seems very likely, or because it has been planned to happen.

No one expected the President to resign.

He wasn't as enthusiastic as I had expected him to be.

I had never been to a fortune-teller before and I didn't know what to expect.

The roadworks are expected to be finished by May.

"He'll lend you the money, won't he?" "I expect so!"

WAIT

To wait to do something or wait for something to happen.

Hurry up, everyone's waiting.

Wait here until I get back.

Jim was standing outside the supermarket, waiting for the bus.

All the people are waiting to see the manager.

LOOK FORWARD TO

To be excited and pleased about something that is going to happen. To anticipate.

I look forward to hearing from you.

My mother says she's looking forward to meeting you.

I'm really looking forward to our holiday.
