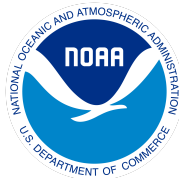

Report Summary

This report documents and details community visioning and project implementation efforts of the 2021-2024 Minnesota Sea Grant and University of Minnesota Natural Resources Research Institute One Block at a Time Project in the Lincoln Park Neighborhood of Duluth, Minnesota. It shares information on participant recruitment and framing of three community visioning sessions, along with detailed agendas and outcomes for each of the sessions. In addition, the document outlines the Barrels & BBQ Rainwater Education Block Party and rain-barrels-for-resident program that resulted from the visioning sessions. Our intent in preparing this report was to transparently document our process and to provide ideas and inspiration for someone who may consider embarking on similar engagement efforts in their community.

Community Visioning Sessions Overview

Purpose

Three visioning sessions to co-develop and design small-scale neighborhood or city block green infrastructure solutions for the Lincoln Park neighborhood of Duluth, Minnesota, hereafter, Lincoln Park.

Objectives

The objectives of the three sessions were to:

- discuss changes to weather patterns, such as larger and more severe storms, and hear from participants how these changes impact them;
- learn about concerns participants have with wet basements, ponding water on roads, and flooding in Lincoln Park;
- develop rain-ready solutions participants would like to see throughout the Lincoln Park neighborhood and decide where in the neighborhood they could be installed;
- talk about the options for green spaces with multiple purposes, such as gardens that also control flooding; and,
- design a small-scale project to address participant concerns and make a plan to install it in Lincoln Park.

Community Leadership Team

Participant Recruitment Strategies

Two methods, at different scales, were employed to learn about Lincoln Park community needs and priorities: a larger neighborhood-level survey to guide our initial work (for more information on our survey work, please review [Neighborhood Voices: A Lincoln Park Climate and Water Impacts Survey](#)), and focus group events with a select group of individuals to refine feedback provided from the survey. These focus group participants were called our community leadership team. Participants for the community leadership team were primarily recruited in two ways: at farmers markets in conjunction with our community survey, and through email solicitation and invitation from our Great Lakes One Water (GLOW) Lake Superior Team. The purpose of attending farmers markets was to distribute our community survey on climate and flooding challenges to Lincoln Park residents, where survey participants received a \$2 bill in exchange for completing the survey. Interested individuals could also provide their name and contact information if they were interested in joining our community leadership team and participating in our visioning sessions. We attended six farmers markets at Harrison Community Center in the summer of 2022, and received interest from nearly a dozen individuals to participate in our community leadership team. Out of those nearly dozen individuals, four of them engaged in next steps to join our visioning sessions.

The One Block at a Time project was born out of the [Great Lakes One Water \(GLOW\)](#) Lake Superior Team, started in 2018. This Team focuses on the intersection of water resilience and equity, with participation from: Ecolibrium3, City of Duluth Sustainability Office, Love Your Block (two-year [2021-2023] grant project focused on blight, partnership between City of Duluth Life Safety and Community Action Duluth), Udac, Duluth Superior Area Community Foundation, and University of Minnesota Sea Grant and Natural Resources Research Institute. GLOW is a working group of [Ready North](#). Email solicitation to Lincoln Park residents and leaders from

GLOW team members garnered interest from six individuals to participate in our community leadership team.

Additional recruitment efforts were used to expand the demographic of participants to include those who identify as male, as the initial community leadership team composition was only females. Through additional efforts from community members already signed up to participate in visioning sessions as well as help from our professional networks, 2 males were recruited to join the community visioning team.

Individuals who expressed interest in joining the visioning sessions were asked to fill out a Participant Interest and Scheduling Google Form to collect information regarding their availability, food sensitivities and access considerations. From the 12 individuals who expressed initial interest in joining the community team and filled out [this interest form](#), 10 individuals ultimately participated in visioning sessions.

Participants

The community leadership team consisted of eight females and two males. All participants identified as white. One individual was 18-24 in age; three individuals were 25-34; two individuals were 35-44; two individuals were 45-54; two individuals were 55-64 in age. Two individuals had a high school diploma or GED; seven individuals had a bachelor's degree; and one individual had a master's degree or higher. Nine of the ten participants owned their home; one individual rented their home. Four participants have annual household incomes of less than \$30k/year; one participant was \$30-49k; one participant was \$50-69k; three participants were \$70-100k; and one participant had a household income greater than \$100k. Six participants either owned businesses in the Lincoln Park community, or worked for a business or organization either within, or serving, the community.

Addressing Barriers to Participation

Equity-centered work recognizes every participant does not enter our spaces from the same background or with the same support or level of access. Thus, to the extent possible, we strove to minimize or remove barriers our community leadership team members might have in participating in the community visioning sessions.

Location

Community visioning sessions were hosted at the Ecolibrium3 Resilience Hub (2014 W. 3rd Street, Duluth, MN 55806). Prior to being the Ecolibrium3 office building, this building served as a community center for the elderly. As such, it boasts a large kitchen and dining area which has since been converted to a gathering and meeting room. In addition to being located within our focus community, this facility offers ample on-street parking, a small parking lot, and is accessible through the public transportation bus line. A few of our community team members chose to walk to the Resilience Hub for our meetings.

Meals

Initially, we intended to only serve snacks at our meetings, but feedback on our interest form indicated some participants had concerns regarding food security. Due to this feedback, we switched to serving a light meal: soup, bread, crackers, fruit and cookies at one meeting; sandwiches, chips, fruit and cookies at the second; and, wraps, fruit, chips and cookies at our final meeting. Our budget was \$75 per meeting, and we worked with the local grocery co-op to

purchase our meal. All food items provided were organic, local when possible, and served using compostable dishware. Gluten-free and vegan/vegetarian items were also provided.

We did not request a discount and did not receive any food items as a donation. We felt it was important to fully support the local grocery cooperative and ensure our financial resources flowed back to the community we were engaging.

Welcoming Family

Our meeting space was large enough to provide space for our community leadership team and any family members. Again, we received feedback on our interest form of a participant who had childcare needs, and the only way for them to participate in the visioning sessions was if their child was also able to attend. We were happy to welcome them, we were prepared with a plan for child care if the situation warranted it (they were old enough to entertain themselves), and made sure they were also fed.

Validating Expertise

To express gratitude and validation for the time and expertise of the community leadership team, our project prioritized budgeting sufficient funds to compensate community leadership team members for their time. We budgeted for 10 individuals to be compensated for 6 hours of their time at \$20/hour. The University of Minnesota system offers volunteer payment in the form of Visa gift cards that act similarly to a debit card. For each two hour visioning session attended, \$40 was deposited onto the gift cards. One community member was unable to attend our visioning sessions due to scheduling conflicts, and instead, we hosted a 1-on-1 meeting with them; we compensated their time for this 1-on-1 meeting as well. In the future, we would match payments equivalent to volunteer rates from [Independent Sector](#).

Meeting and Space Coordination & Set-Up

Considerations made for the first visioning session were repeated for the second and third visioning sessions. First, the facilitators made sure to arrive about an hour before the session started to provide ample time for set-up and to test technology. Food was set-up on a separate table adjacent to the meeting tables and was made available as soon as community members arrived. Time was set aside at the beginning of the meeting to allow folks time to eat, meet with each other, and have conversation amongst the group.

Blank name tags were provided for participants to fill out their name and pronouns. Folders were provided with project overview materials and Visa debit card information. A large flip chart was set-up off to the side for “parking lot” items - topics of concern or interest raised by community members but were outside the scope of our discussion or this project. After every session, relevant parking lot items were forwarded to colleagues or individuals within our network, and any information was brought back to the group at the next session or through follow-up email.

We allowed for remote participation at our first meeting to accommodate an individual who was ill and unable to attend in person. We utilized a separate laptop and an Owl Conference Camera, which rotates and highlights the individual currently speaking. During each meeting the three facilitators divided duties as follows: two shared meeting facilitation duties, while a third person was dedicated to taking notes and managing the “parking lot” flip chart.

 - Have you taken any actions to reduce flooding or impacts of water to living spaces?
 - What are some of the specific challenges that you have observed in dealing with flooding or other water impacts in the Lincoln Park neighborhood?

Responsible for flooding, flip chart 4:

- Who is responsible for managing flooding and water challenges?
- Follow-up questions for group:
 - How do we encourage or support our government to take on responsibility?
 - What actions can businesses take?
 - What is needed so more individuals can take on responsibility for this work?

Barriers, flip chart 5:

- What barriers exist to managing flooding and water challenges?
 - Address each scale - homeowner, business, city
- Follow-up question for group:
 - Are there any resources or information that you feel are lacking in our community when it comes to addressing water and climate change challenges?

Solutions, flip chart 6:

- What are beneficial solutions to managing flooding and water challenges?
 - Physical solutions, partnership/relationship, funding, education
- Follow-up questions for group:
 - In your opinion, what steps should our community take to prepare for future flooding events?
 - Do you have any suggestions for how our community can work together to address these issues and build a more resilient future?

Group Discussion Summary

The group discussion was summarized and captured on large flip charts during the event and through digital notes taken by one of the facilitators. See [flip chart photos](#) in the appendix.

What impacts you now and what do you believe will impact you in the future?

- Uphill impervious surfaces
- No gutters- Walkways dangerous, slanted sidewalks may cause basement flooding
- Water melt and freeze causes hills and roads to ice- can anything be done about this?
- Emerald ash borer- A lot of tree benefits are gone (holds soil and water), dead trees could increase fire risk?
 - Varying tree species to lessen spread, trees fit for infrastructure, lots of decision planning, planting time period
- Access to what people want/ need- Access to free water barrels, compost, ect
- Duluth as a "Climate refuge"- econ and affordability, how much has the climate already changed

What flooding and water challenges have you noticed in Lincoln Park?

- Flooding creating new paths for water- maintenance of runoff areas, sidewalk tipping, not enough storm drains- noticed in multiple neighborhoods (mndot combining creeks, city adds drains)
- Winter was wet and heavy- ice blocked storm drains, more precipitation, wetter snow, could increase icing, more freeze thaw events
- Sump pump draining right into neighbors front yard, causing icy sidewalks, no drain tiles on sump pumps? Where can sump pumps drain
- Diverting 2 creeks into one
- Box culverts?
- Mega rain event (8 in of rain in 24 hrs) becoming more frequent
- No space for runoff ponds (potholes), productive for water but what about pollution? How to make it a sink?

What have you done to manage flood and water challenges?

- Plant spot before street as rain ready but everything died (plows come right up to street)
- Rain barrel, clear leaves
- Would like to plant trees
- Have a sump pump
- Volunteer with stream corp to plant trees

Who is responsible for managing flooding and water challenges?

- City (stormwater tanks, last line of defense, awareness and understanding challenges and needs, planning zoning maintaining infrastructure) & State Governments, Transportation Depts
- Groups with money to take on challenges
- All of the above
- Land development in fragile areas, changes hydrology (cultural, pop expansion, who's responsible?)
- Us?/ landlords
- Impermeable surfaces/ developments up the hill, hermantown has different rules, fees for runoff increase interest for large corps to decrease stormwater

What barriers exist to managing flooding and water challenges?

- All (Residents, Business, City): Money, Stormwater and watershed literacy, apathy, politics, scale of solution is outside of our control, infrastructure (aging, tech) and existing built environment, environmental group educating people on how to protect their watersheds (how to reach everyone?), tangible positive messaging vs doom, lack of trust and understanding, school programming

What are beneficial solutions to managing flooding and water challenges?

- Education
- Free access to rain barrels and stuff, beds, gardens, free trees & plants
- Native plants, protect wetlands
- Zoning
- Less or no salt (what's the solution for that for steep hills?), sweeping, fine line, cultural values (people want to do things immediately or need access)
- Stop building on hills?

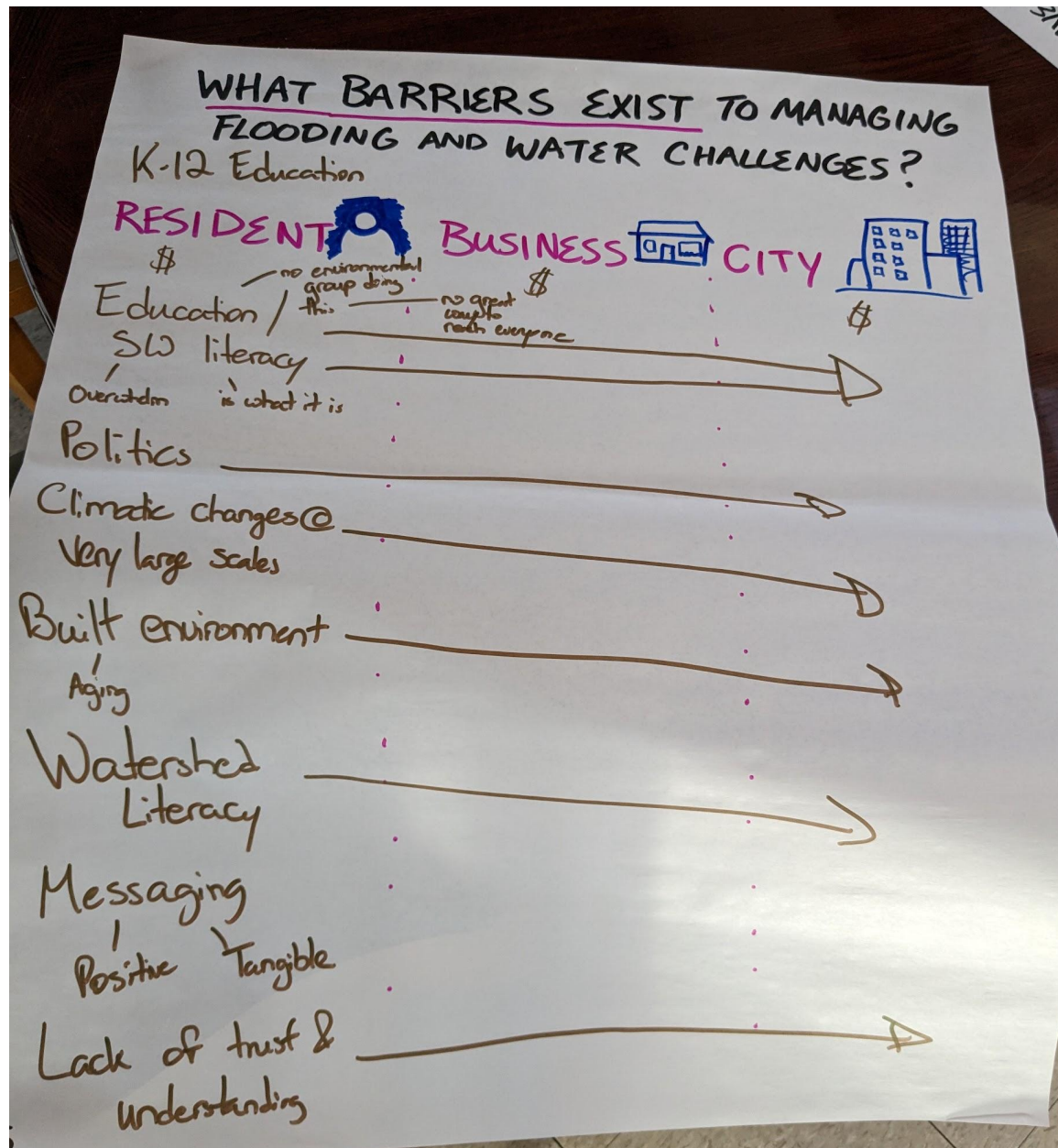

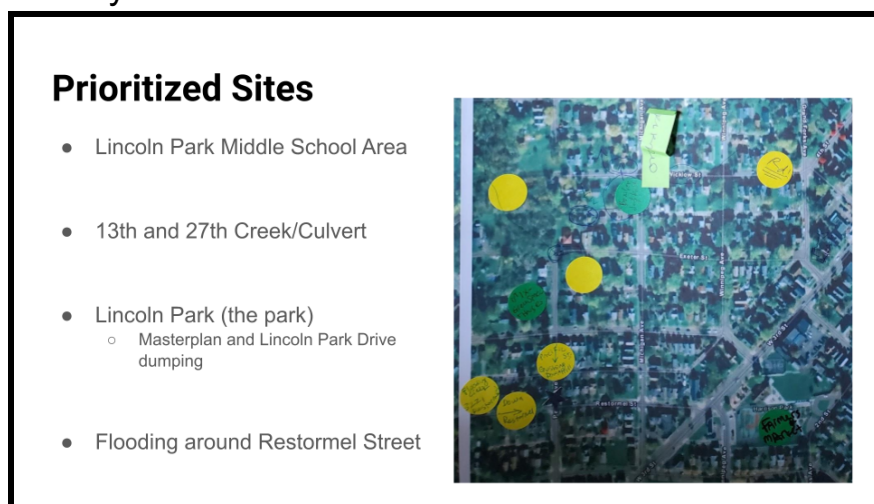


Figure 2. Summary of prioritized sites identified by the community leadership team based on the mapping exercise conducted in the second visioning session.

Date: June 21, 2023

Location: 3200 Block of Restormel & Devonshire Streets; Lincoln Park Middle School; Walbank Park

Time: 7:00 - 8:30 pm

Purpose

Field investigation of potential project sites to assess feasibility for green infrastructure project.

Objectives

The objectives of the community site visit were to:

- walk the neighborhood to better understand water movement and flow;
- assess the scale and severity of water challenges at priority sites identified from community visioning session 2; and,
- gauge green infrastructure implementation project feasibility at one priority site.

Process Agenda

7:00-8:30 Gather and walk neighborhood

Group Discussion

- Lincoln Park Middle School and its associated sidewalk to the school is a challenging area due to the vast amount of bedrock and current construction on Devonshire Street.
- Two undeveloped sections of green space on Restormel Street, each with a creek bed running through. One of these sites is adjacent to documented overland water flow challenges onto Restormel Street that lead to icing issues in the late winter/early spring. It appears an inlet is blocked, and water is not appropriately flowing through this creek bed, but rather flowing through someone's yard, emptying onto the street. The storm drain on the street is not aligned with the water flow path, so water does not enter the storm drain. This leads to sheet flow of water on the street, and depending on the time of year, is very icy.
- Culverts are outside the scope of this project due to their cost and engineering requirements.
- Because of the Lincoln Park (the park) mini-master plan and updates to the park, it is beyond the scope (time, money, and number of individuals we'd need to involve) of our project efforts to work within the Park.
- 32nd Ave W Creek is visible at Walbank Park, but then is completely buried for the remainder of its flow through the neighborhood.
- Looks as though we could do some type of planting adjacent to the green space that could try to absorb the overland water flow. This property is a rental, and the individual renting there is a community team member. We would need to seek property owner approval, which seems feasible.

Session Summary

Pursuing a green infrastructure project on the 3200 of Restormel Street, likely a planting effort paired with education on stormwater and green infrastructure for residents living on block seems feasible. Note: this was an optional meeting for community leadership team members, and their time was not compensated; three members participated in this walk-about.

Follow-Up Site Visit with City of Duluth Stormwater

Following the site visit with members from the community team, facilitators Madison Rodman and Tiffany Sprague did a follow-up community site visit on July 7, 2023 with Ryan Granlund, Stormwater Specialist with the City of Duluth. This visit dug further into the stormwater challenges surrounding Restormel Street, and revealed a planting project was likely not feasible. In brief, a gravel alley above the green spaces was causing gravel runoff into the creek bed below, plugging stormwater inlets, and resulting in overland flow into the adjacent properties. Ryan alerted City staff and put in a work request to address the clogged inlets. Ryan was invited to the third visioning session to explain the situation and help brainstorm with the group potential project ideas.

Session Summary

After learning from City stormwater staff of the various complications and factors contributing to the water issue on Restormel Street, the community team realized a planting project was likely not adequate to address these concerns. The community team emphasized the need for education to residents on what actions they can take to manage water on their property and how to contact the City to report utility problems in general. The team thought a block party could be a good way to provide education and bring residents together, and was very adamant that door knocking and door fliers were important ways to advertise the block party. The team also wanted block party attendees to leave with something that would allow folks to start taking immediate action, such as a rain barrel or similar.

Barrels and BBQ Block Party

Date: September 26, 2023

Location: 3200 Block Restormel Street, Lincoln Park Neighborhood, Duluth, MN

Time: 4-6pm

Purpose

Bring together Lincoln Park neighbors to learn more about rainwater and runoff.

Objectives

The objectives of the block party were to:

- provide watershed and stormwater education to residents;
- register neighbors to receive rain barrels and rain barrel installation;
- increase climate resilience and rain-ready preparedness education by connecting residents with partner organizations; and,
- build connections with, and among, neighbors.

Process Agenda Summary

The process agenda for the block party was highly specific to our work in Lincoln Park and included details such as timing and permitting processes for Duluth, Minnesota and communication with partners. Instead of sharing in its entirety within this document, we've included a few key considerations we would like to ensure are remembered as well as offered for consideration to you, our reader. These highlights include:

- **Advertising:** Door knocking and door hangers advertising the block party took place approximately two weeks before the event. This meant the hanger was designed, and approved by necessary staff, and sent to a print shop about a month before the event took place. A member of the community leadership team went door-to-door with Madison Rodman to invite residents to the project and answer any questions. We were able to talk with residents of approximately one quarter of the homes who received a door hanger invitation. The door hanger was designed by one of the community team members who received additional compensation for graphic design work.
- **Food:** A full meal was provided at the block party, rather than snacks. Our meal was purchased from a local vendor (Howard's 'Que). Due to working with a local vendor not previously established in the University system, we also started to coordinate this approximately a month before the block party. Vegetarian and gluten free options were available.
- **Low Waste:** To minimize environmental impact, we worked with Western Lake Superior Sanitary District (WLSSD) staff to secure a low-waste event kit to offer composting and recycling options at the block party.
- **Accessibility:** We borrowed tables and foldable chairs from our university departments so participants had a place to sit while dining, and were not required to sit on the ground or stand and eat, as that may be difficult for some individuals.
- **Restroom:** As we were hosting an outside event in a neighborhood, we lacked access to a public restroom. Thus, we worked with a local portable restroom company to secure a wheelchair accessible portable bathroom (porta-potty). Contracts were required, which also took time to coordinate, and thus about a month's lead time was also necessary to secure a portable restroom.

- **Street Closure:** To ensure public safety, and because many residents in the neighborhood park on the street, we worked with the City of Duluth to file the necessary documentation to close the street during our event. This required necessary insurance and liability documents from the University as well. This process took some time to navigate the paperwork and liabilities, and required notification of residents approximately week prior to the event; we notified residents on the same door hanger advertising the block party. The City of Duluth Police Department installed cones with details of the no parking zone and provided barricades for redirecting traffic during the event.
- **Youth:** To provide a family-friendly environment, we worked with one of our partnering organizations, Love Your Block, to provide youth-based activities. We offered a water focused painting and coloring activity, blocks and Legos.
- **Community Trust:** To continue building trust with neighbors, we did not take pictures of attendees and we turned down media opportunities to film at the event. We did not want it to seem as though we were doing this event for publicity only, and we did not want to inadvertently pressure anyone to appear on camera or for their photo to be taken. We asked all participating community partners and organizations to do the same, and to also not post to social media during the event.
- **Rain Plan:** When planning the event we also made sure to have a plan for severe weather and a phone tree for who, and how, to notify all involved with the event if we needed to postpone. Information for who to call was in event of severe weather was also identified on the door hanger.

Event Summary

The block party included the following planned activities:

- Watershed and stormwater education along with free rain barrel sign up (up to 20 barrels available) provided by Minnesota Sea Grant and the University of Minnesota Natural Resources Research Institute.
- Tabling from partner organizations who support building rain and climate-ready neighborhoods and communities. These partners included:
 - City of Duluth Stormwater
 - City of Duluth Sustainability
 - Community Action Duluth
 - Ecolibrium3
 - Western Lake Superior Sanitary District
 - Duluth Superior Area Community Foundation
- Youth engagement activity coordinated by Love Your Block.
- Barbeque dinner for attendees and those supporting tabling provided by Howard's 'Que.

Invited attendees to the block party included:

- Residents in the west Lincoln Park neighborhood surrounding Restormel Street. Door hanger invitations were distributed to approximately 45 homes.
- Ten community leadership team members who live in Lincoln Park and neighbors they invited (each community team member was provided an additional 5 door hanger invitations to hand out to neighbors).

A periodic headcount was taken during the event and was at 48 participants and partners halfway through the 4-6pm event period.

Educational materials created specifically for this event and distributed to neighbors included (1) a [trifold brochure](#) on stormwater basics and how to report utility issues with the City of Duluth, and (2) a [magnet](#) on simple stormwater pollution prevention actions. These materials were developed to address community questions and needs identified during visioning sessions and designed by one of the community team members who received additional compensation for graphic design work.

At the event, 12 individuals signed up to receive a free rain barrel (remaining rain barrels were distributed to interested community leadership team members). In partnership with Community Action Duluth Community Construction, individuals could also sign up for their rain barrel to be installed; 9 individuals signed up for rain barrel installation. This included any necessary supplies, gutters and downspout connections required for their rain barrel to be properly connected. Rain barrels were delivered to and/or installed at residents homes in October 2023. Follow-up information was texted and emailed to rain barrel recipients in November 2023 on how to appropriately winterize their barrel.

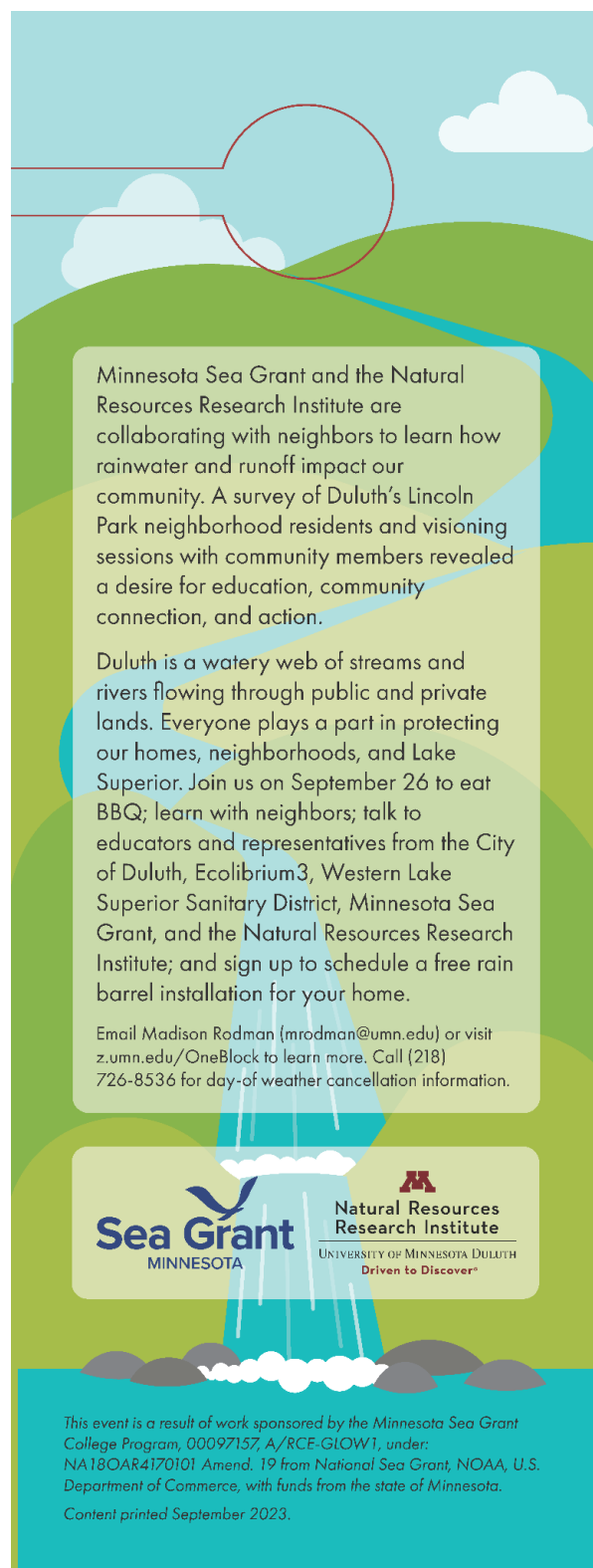


Figure 3. Door hanger invitation (left front, right back) for Barrels & BBQ Rainwater Education & Block Party. September 26, 2023.
