intersection of immigration, education policy, and urban leadership. He has a Master's in Higher Education-Student Affairs from the University of Redlands and a Bachelor's in Sociology, specializing in Computing, from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). While at FWD.us, Christian served as the University Program Intern, working on initiatives to support undocumented students. As a past Graduate Intern at the Presidents' Alliance, he coordinated the K-12 counselor strategy group, supported communications between partners, updated the private institutions tool, and curated student narratives. He has also held roles supporting undocumented students at California State University, San Bernardino, and UCLA's Dream Resource Center. Under Christian's leadership, NavigateED Solutions has worked with institutions like Claremont Graduate University and Pomona College. The firm redesigns websites to make them more user-friendly, and inclusive of undocumented students and conducts workshops on topics from scholarships to writing for personal statements. Christian co-authored a career guide for FWD.us and delivered empowering keynotes on his immigration and education journeys, and ongoing advocacy. In this role, he oversees the Pritzker Access Scholarship and provides comprehensive support to Noble's undocumented populations and their families, guiding them through the challenges of high school and supporting their journey through college.
