

**The Latin root "vis" means see. The words derived from "vis":**

**1. Visible**

**Meaning:** Capable of being seen.

**Explanation:** Combining "re-" (again) with "visus," it means to look at something again to improve or correct it.

6. **Visit**

**Meaning:** To go and see a person or place.

**Example:** We plan to visit our grandparents this weekend.

**Explanation:** From "visitare," which means "to go to see" in Latin, this word implies the act of going somewhere to see someone or something.

7. **Visual**

**Meaning:** Related to seeing or sight.

**Example:** The presentation included many visual aids to help explain the concepts.

**Explanation:** Derived from "visualis," which means "of sight" in Latin, it pertains to anything related to vision.

8. **Envision**

**Meaning:** To imagine or visualize.

**Example:** She could envision a future where she achieved all her goals.

**Explanation:** From "en-" (in) and "vision," it means to form a mental image of something.

9. **Vista**

**Meaning:** A pleasing view, especially one seen through a long, narrow opening.

**Example:** The mountain trail offered a breathtaking vista of the valley below.

**Explanation:** This word comes from the Italian "vista" (view), which is derived from the Latin "visus."

## 10. Evidence

**Meaning:** Information indicating whether a belief or proposition is true or valid.

**Explanation:** From "evidentia," meaning "obvious to the eye or mind" in Latin, it signifies the power of proof or visible information that supports a conclusion.

## 11. Provision

**Meaning:** The action of providing or supplying something for use.

**Example Sentence:** The army made **provisions** for the long journey ahead.

**Explanation:** Derived from "providere," which means "to foresee, to provide."

## 12. Revisit

**Meaning:** To visit again.

**Example Sentence:** We decided to **revisit** our favorite childhood vacation spot.

**Explanation:** Combining "re-" (again) with "visit," meaning to see again.

## 13. Surveillance

**Meaning:** Close observation, especially of a suspected spy or criminal.

**Example Sentence:** The police kept the suspect under constant **surveillance**.

**Explanation:** From "sur-" (over) and "veiller" (to watch), originally from Latin "vigilare" (to watch).
