In reading *Frankenstein* with an eye towards the author, we learn that Shelley's inspiration came to her soon after losing her first child to a premature birth and shortly after the birth of her second child. Understanding the author's mindset as a young woman in a world where children and mothers often died young, analysts look at Frankenstein as a story about the anxiety of a new mother towards her child.

Looking at *Frankenstein* through a psychoanalytic lens, Victor Frankenstein's monster is a representation of the "id" of not only Victor Frankenstein, but also of Mary Shelley. Shelley creates Frankenstein's character in a like image of herself, exploring her own pleasure principle by puppeteering Frankenstein.
