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Introduction

"And you see the mountains, thinking them motionless, while they will pass as the passing of clouds. [It is] the work of Allāh, who perfected all things. Indeed, He is Aware of that which you do." (27:88)

By this comparison, one can appreciate the unparalleled craftsmanship of Allah and the miracles in the tiniest details in our lives.
