A note on the * annotations:

Some CI community guidelines, marked *, place primary emphasis on taking care of others and the group. Specifically, the marked guidelines are the ones that meet two criteria. First, there are more words addressing taking care of and respecting each other and the group, listening for "yes," and doing no harm than about taking care of oneself and saying "no." Second, the words addressing taking care of and respecting each other and the group, listening for "yes," and doing no harm come before the words addressing taking care of oneself and saying "no." These criteria were articulated by Michele Beaulieux in what has come to be known as the "Beaulieu test." The other guidelines generally follow the "first rule" of CI in prioritizing individuals taking care of themselves and in giving the ability to say "no" more prominence than the skill of listening for "yes."

Marking some guidelines in this way is intended to foreground a particular discussion around consent that is ongoing in parts of the CI community; these marks represent personal opinions that do not necessarily reflect a consensus of the CI community as a whole.

Many groups continue to evolve their guidelines; if you feel an unmarked guideline now warrants an *, please make an edit and leave a comment explaining.

Note that only guidelines can have a star as the test only applies to guidelines. Thus, none of the other documents in this list have any stars.
