- The Fire Next time by James Baldwin Immensely influential and profoundly
 moving, Baldwin's twin letters on his childhood in Harlem and the omnipresent evil of
 racism in American society were pivotal in the galvanising of the US civil rights
 movement. Unfailing eloquent and brimming with passion and heartache, The Fire
 Next Time frames the battles of the 1960s in an urgent and ever more relevant

- The Autobiography of Malcolm X by Alex Haley, Malcolm X and Paul Gilroy An extraordinary autobiography detailing Malcolm X's life through his actions, interaction with the media and speeches. (Waterstones, 2020b).
- Between the World and Me by Ta-Nehisi Coates Intensely intimate and
 unfailingly eloquent, Coates's dissection of America's tumultuous relationship with
 race is an invigorating collection of personal flashpoints that broadened the author's
 understanding of racial injustice in modern America. Frames as a wrenching letter to
 his teenage son, Between the World and Me is a classic in the making. (Waterstones,

- Killing Rage Ending Racism by Bell Hooks Compiled of twenty-three essays are
 written from a black and feminist perspective, and they tackle the bitter difficulties of
 racism by envisioning a world without it. They address a spectrum of topics having to
 do with race and racism in the United States: psychological trauma among African
 Americans; friendship between Black women and White women; anti-Semitism and
 racism; and internalizd racism in movies and the media. (Macmillan Publishers US,
 2020).
- Becoming by Michelle Obama Michelle Obama invites readers into her world, chronicling the experiences that have shaped her - from her childhood on the South Side of Chicago to her years as an executive balancing the demands of motherhood and work, to her time spent at the world's most famous address. (Goodreads Inc, 2020a).
- How we Get Free by Keeanga-Yamhtta Taylor A collection of essays and interviews edited by activist-scholar Keeanga-Yamahtta Taylor, founding members of

- the organization and contemporary activists reflects on the legacy of its contributions to Black feminism and its impact on today's struggles. (HaymarketBooks, 2020).
- Black Feminist Thought by Patricia Hill Collins explores the words and ideas of Black feminist intellectuals as well as those African-American women outside academe. She not only provides an interpretive framework for the work of such prominent Black feminist thinkers as Angela Davis, Alice Walker, and Audre Lorde, but she shows the importance of self-defined knowledge for group empowerment. - Ain't I a Woman Black Women and Feminism by Bell Hooks A groundbreaking work of feminst history and theory analyzing the complex relations between various forms of oppression. Ain't I a Woman examines the impact of sexism on black women during slavery, the historic devaluation of black womanhood, black male sexism, racism within the recent women's movement, and black women's involvement with feminsim. - Bad Feminist by Roxane Gay This is the text for those of us who constructed our feminism from the pages of teen chick lit as much as from the musings of post-modern theorists. Gay gives us permission to take up the sword of feminism while laying down the shield of policed authenticity. As a result, we complete this book both more powerful and more vulnerable, just like Gay herself. How can you help but love this author? (Melissa Harris-Perry, 2020).
- Eloquent Rage by Brittney Cooper Far too often, Black women's anger has been caricatured into an ugly and destructive force that threatens the civility and social fabric of American democracy. But Cooper shows us that there is more to the story than that. Black women's eloquent rage is what makes Serena Williams such a powerful tennis player. It's what makes Beyoncé's girl power anthems resonate so hard. It's what makes Michelle Obama an icon. (Goodreads Inc, 2020b).
- In Search of Our Mothers Gardens by Alice Walker In this, her first collection of nonfiction, Alice Walker speaks out as a black woman, writer, mother, and feminist in thirty-six pieces ranging from the personal to the political. Among the contents are essays about other writers, accounts of the civil rights movement of the 1960s and the antinuclear movement of the 1980s, and a vivid memoir of a scarring childhood injury and her daughter's healing words. (Goodreads Inc, 2020c).
- Giovanni's Room by James Baldwin David, a young American in 1950s Paris, is waiting for his fiancée to return from vacation in Spain. But when he meets Giovanni,, the two men are drawn into an intense affair. After three months David's fiancée

- returns and, denying his true nature, he rejects Giovanni for a 'safe' future as a married man. His decision eventually brings tragedy. Filled with passion, regret and longing, this story of a fated love triangle has become a landmark of gay writing. James Baldwin caused outrage as a black author writing about white homosexuals, yet for him the issues of race, sexuality and personal freedom were eternally intertwined. (Penguin Random House, 2020b).
- Zami by Audre Lorde A little black girl opens her eyes in 1930s Harlem, weak and half-blind. On she stumbles - through teenage pain and loneliness, but then to happiness in friendship, work and sex, from Washington Heights to Mexico, always changing, always strong. This is Audre Lorde's story. A rapturous, life-affirming autobiographical novel by the 'Black, lesbian, mother, warrior poet', it changed the literary landscape. (Penguin Random House, 2020c).
- Real Life by Brandon Taylor Almost everything about Wallace is at odds with the Midwestern university town where he is working uneasily toward a biochem degree. An introverted young man from Alabama, black and queer, he has left behind his family without escaping the long shadows of his childhood. For reasons of self-preservation, Wallace has enforced a wary distance even within his own circle of friends—some dating each other, some dating women, some feigning straightness. But over the course of a late-summer weekend, a series of confrontations with colleagues, and an unexpected encounter with an ostensibly straight, white classmate, conspire to fracture his defenses while exposing long-hidden currents of hostility and desire within their community. (Penguin Random House, 2020d).
- Unapologetic A black, queer, and feminist Mandate for Radical Movements by Charlene A Carruthers Appearing on The Roots' annual list, in 2017, as one of the most influential young African Americans, Carruthers--at age 32--is among a handful of high profile activists. Her debut book upends mainstream ideas about race, class and gender and sets forth a radically inclusive path to collective liberation. Her inclusive story about Black struggle draws on Black intellectual and grassroots organizing traditions including the Haitian Revolution, U.S. Civil Rights, and Black and LGBTQ Feminist Movements. Bold and honest, *Unapologetic* is an inside look from an on-the-ground activist and movement leader about how to move people from the margins to the center of political strategy and practice. - No Tea, No Shade: New Writings in Black Queer Studies by E. Patrick Johnson
 The follow-up to the groundbreaking Black Queer Studies, the edited collection No
 Tea, No Shade brings together nineteen essays from the next generation of scholars,

- activists, and community leaders doing work on black gender and sexuality. Building on the foundations laid by the earlier volume, this collection's contributors speak new truths about the black queer experience while exemplifying the codification of Black queer studies as a rigorous and important field of study. (Goodreads Inc, 2020e).
- Since I Laid My Burden Down by Brontz Purnell DeShawn lives a high, creative, and promiscuous life in San Francisco. But when he's called back to his cramped Alabama hometown for his uncle's funeral, he's hit by flashbacks of handsome, doomed neighbors and sweltering Sunday services. Amidst prickly reminders of his childhood, DeShawn ponders family, church, and the men in his life, prompting the question: Who deserves love? (The Feminist Press, 2017).
