Heron Creek will continue to train teachers and educational staff on the needs of students and technology to provide distance learning. HC will provide technology, account access to Google Classroom and other distance learning apps as necessary. Admin and staff will communicate with students and families that are impacted by communicable diseases and develop individualized plans for providing access to learning. Admin and staff will monitor student progress and provide opportunities to communicate regularly with teachers for support. Heron Creek can utilize their Bridge program teacher to work in the home and collaborate with the district if the student will no longer be enrolled (after 10 days) at Heron Creek.

Planning for and implementing proactive health and safety mitigation measures assists schools in reducing communicable disease transmission within the school environment for students, staff, and community members. Communicable disease, including norovirus, flu and COVID-19, will continue to circulate in our communities and our schools. Schools will utilize different mitigation measures based on local data, and observation of

Communicable Disease Mitigation Measures

Immunizations	CDC, OHA, and ODE recommend COVID-19 vaccination for all eligible individuals. Please include whether your school will offer COVID-19 vaccine clinics or notices about where to access vaccines in your community. Shots are required by law for children in attendance at public and private schools, preschools, child care facilities, and Head Start programs in Oregon. Nearly every place that provides care for a child outside the home requires shots or a medical or nonmedical exemption to stay enrolled.
Face Coverings	 In most situations, face coverings will be optional. Possible exceptions to this rule: At any time, districts that host our programs can change their guidelines to require face coverings of staff in their buildings. Key things to remember: Many people will choose to continue wearing masks even when they're not required. Clackamas ESD protects and affirms the choice of all our employees to wear face coverings whenever they prefer. We respect and honor the individual choices our colleagues make to protect their health and the health of those around them. Please talk with your supervisor if you encounter any challenges. Employees who choose to wear masks may decline any request to remove those masks at work. Alternatively, in some situations, employees will be asked to wear masks to protect the health of students or families we serve.
Isolation	A space will be made available to isolate sick children from injured children that need assistance per OAR 581-022-2220. Staff that manage the isolation room of ill children will be trained on Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) requirements.
Symptom Screening	Staff are trained to monitor students throughout the school day for excludable symptoms. We partner with Clackamas County public health and report known positive cases and enforce health department isolation periods for staff and students. CESD follows the ODE/ OHA guidance for schools.
COVID-19 Diagnostic Testing	OHA offers schools a diagnostic testing program to all public and private K-12 schools in Oregon. Please indicate whether your school will offer diagnostic testing. At this time, Heron Creek (CESD) does not offer diagnostic testing.

Airflow and Circulation	Marylhurst University has updated the Ventilation System to include Hepa filtration. In addition Each classroom and common areas are equipped with individual HEPA filters.
Cohorting	Heron Creek (CESD) has returned to pre-pandemic configurations regarding classroom setups, meal periods, and cohort.
Physical Distancing	Heron Creek (CESD) has returned to pre-pandemic configurations regarding physical distancing.
Hand Washing	Hand hygiene will continue to be emphasized as one of the most important and effective mitigation measures against communicable disease. Hand sanitizer will be provided for use when hand washing is not an option. Surface wipes are provided for all classrooms to be wiped down on a daily basis.
Cleaning and Disinfection	Daily janitorial cleaning protocols include cleaning and disinfection of high touch surfaces once every 24 hours. Staff members are encouraged to frequently clean/disinfect their workspaces and CESD provides adequate approved supplies for this purpose. CESD maintains supplies (foggers/chemicals) for enhanced disinfection of large areas should the need arise
Training and Public Health Education	Heron Creek (CESD) leadership regularly communicates with staff to update and reinforce guidelines.
