The Paseo Project is delighted to announce On Site, the inaugural exhibition at The Gallery at Hotel Willa. This exhibit celebrates the extraordinary talents of local artists and artisans whose work enlivens the newly remodeled Hotel Willa grounds in Taos.

Opening in May 2025, Hotel Willa represents the transformation of the historic Indian Hills Motel into a unique "art hotel" destination, blending Taos' distinctive hospitality with creative expression. Developed by The Casetta Group, this reimagined hotel in downtown Taos features 51 guest rooms, a restaurant and bar, an outdoor pool, a 2,000-square-foot gallery, and an on-site Artist in Residence Program. Together, Hotel Willa and The Paseo Project are committed to providing year-round opportunities for local artists to engage with the community and visitors.

In tribute to Taos' vibrant art culture, Hotel Willa collaborated with local artists and artisans to create an inspiring aesthetic throughout its rooms and shared spaces. For On Site, The Paseo Project has curated a selection of works by these talented artists, offering an expanded view of the creativity featured in the hotel's interiors.

On Site features works by artists including Afton Love, Abby Salsbury, Dawning Pollen Shorty, Sean Ratliff, Johnny Defeo, Boramie Sao, Izumi Yokoyama, Dean Pulver, Debbie Long, Aaron John Dubois, Paulina Ho and more. In addition to these artists, the exhibition will highlight contributions from the many hands involved in the project, from contractors to landscapers, as well as special works by restaurateurs Maida Branch and Johnny Ortiz-Concha; security personnel, Mark Kemper; and contractor, TILT.

#### Biography

Born in New York City, I grew up in the Berkshire Hills of Western Massachusetts with very early and consistent encouragement in the arts. I attended the Philadelphia College of Art and The University of Colorado, studying in the clay studios headed by William Daley and Betty Woodman; graduating with a BFA in ceramics from PCA. During my eight months in Boulder I explored, discovering Taos, NM, loving its similarities to my northeastern home: an intimate community with support for the arts. During a short stint back in Massachusetts, my husband, sculptor and furniture maker Dean Pulver, and I started a gallery called "The Artistry" with the goal of supporting local artists exhibiting high quality fine crafts which would inform and educate the public about their place in the art world. During this time I maintained my studio, developed my pottery line, attended wholesale shows and taught classes. In 1996 Dean and I left the Berkshires for Snowmass Village, Colorado to work at the Anderson Ranch Arts Center. When our summer work and studies ended we made our way south and, with fond memories of my earlier southwest explorations, settled in Taos, NM. Since then, I have concentrated on my clay business, Butterpie Productions. In the fall of 2003 I decided it was time to refuel those creative juices and i enrolled in the University of New Mexico/Taos's Printmaking classes. Nine years later I received a scholarship in the printmaking studios of the Penland School for Crafts in North Carolina. At present my work is varied and multi-layered, encompassing many techniques, materials and processes. I am still actively producing my Butterpie Production's

Tableware line and making prints, as well as works that are a hybrid of the two - just to keep things interesting.

#### Biography

Johnny DeFeo (b. 1985) received an MFA in painting from the University of Colorado in 2017. Shortly after graduating he co-founded Adventure Painting, a traveling artist residency, alongside painter Aaron Zulpo. The Adventure Painting residency takes artists out of their studios and into America's most beautiful locations with the goal of expanding the visual lexicon of landscape painting. Adventure Painting was selected as an Armory Show off-site project in 2021, and featured in the New York Times. DeFeo's aesthetic is wild and playful, utilizing a dose of humor to create objects that illuminate the connections between beauty both quintessential and manufactured. His work consists primarily of landscape scenes, many of which include animals. Often, the perspective expressed in these scenes is that of the animal, shifting the subject away from a human vantage point and revealing the mysteries of the natural world. Imagining that the creatures inhabiting America's wilderness could be storytellers through

objects and images the way that humans can, these objects portray the natural world with atender perspective, and with mystical and legendary qualities

## Biography

Boramie Sao is a self-taught Cambodian American Artist from Long Beach, California, currently residing in Taos, New Mexico. Sao reflects upon the challenging landscapes of the high desert where she lives, and ties a deep symbolism to any life that persists through the most tumultuous elements. She connects this symbolism to her heritage and ancestry, where the family stories passed down from her elders inspired the work she creates today. These intimate lessons she grew up with lie at the heart of her work, which would be left untold if not through oral or shared tradition.

Sao's acute observation of her environment and the meditative practice that has developed throughout the years of painting, gave her an understanding of balance and a profound appreciation for beauty within the natural world. The inherent stillness she strives to capture through her use of symbols, textures, colors and organic forms, are meant to tell these stories in a subtle, interpretive way. Sao's titles work in a narrative form, gesturing a hint of her own experiences while leaving space for imagination. Her intuitive color palettes and unique use of shapes dwell in the depths of each piece, leaving the viewer to question whether it is meant to hide or reveal something beyond the surface.

# Biography

Debbie Long is an artist who works with light, creating sculptures and immersive environments that shift in response to the natural world. For over a decade, she has focused on Light Ships—large-scale outdoor sculptures that use the sun and moon as their sole source of illumination. These chambers of color and glass are designed for visitors to sit inside and experience the gradual transformations of light throughout the day and night. Hundreds of handmade cast-glass objects catch and refract light from the sky, creating an evolving interior that responds to the cycles of the sun, passing clouds, and shifting moonlight.

The first of these works, Naima Light Ship, was built between 2012–2015, followed by Willa Light Ship 2015–2020, completed in her Taos studio. Each Light Ship invites visitors to slow down and engage deeply with the rhythms of the natural world—watching the sun set over hours, witnessing twilight's subtle shifts, or waiting for the moon to illuminate the space. These works encourage an embodied experience of time and light.

In addition to her Light Ships, Long creates installations, films, and sculptures exploring material, perception, and environment. Her work has been exhibited widely, including at the Harwood Museum of Art, High Desert Test Sites, LAND/ART New Mexico, Chimento Contemporary, and 5.Gallery in Santa Fe. Recognized by grants and residencies, she also worked as a studio assistant to Ken Price. Originally from Gallup, New Mexico, Long now lives and works in Taos, continuing to explore the transformative potential of light and space.

## Biography

Aron John Dubois (b.1989, Boulder, CO) is a painter and an internationally recognized tattoo artist based in Santa Fe, New Mexico. As a self-taught artist, Dubois has honed his craft in tattooing, painting, ceramics, and other media by meticulous study and self-directed practice. His work predominantly addresses the enigma of nature, corporeality, and archetypal drama through a lens influenced by art brut, folk mysticism, anthropology, and the grotesque. Working primarily on paper media with layered watercolor, ink, and gouache, he creates earthly altar-like compositions decorated with a symbolic language born of his own mythology and spiritual inquiry.

Through the social incubator that it TiLT, Todd Wynward and his allies stir together a lean & adaptive non-profit organization with an adobe co-housing hacienda, a host of innovative community-based projects, a strong dose of prophetic imagination, a taste for wilderness spirituality, a menu of immersive multi-cultural experiences and a handful of entrepreneurial microbusinesses in an attempt to create the better world we know is possible. At TiLT, we aspire to walk in the socially transformative footsteps of Saint Francis, Joanna Macy, Mahatma Gandhi and Vendana Shiva. Repurposing Plastic: Turning Waste into Walls

What is this thing? What you see before you is a marketable product called the Redi-Wall, an  $8' \times 50'' \times 16''$  modular wall. It consists of a frame constructed by artisan Randy Martinez of metal fencing and stucco wire, which he then stuffed with 200 pounds of post-consumer plastic. He used a pneumatic hog-ring gun to create the metal basket. The plastic sheeting has been cut away to reveal the Rediwall's contents.

Why do we build walls out of waste plastic?

Our modern consumer economy worldwide has caused a plastic pollution problem at a global scale. Despite what institutions lead us to believe, hardly any plastic is actually recycled. Every

day, millions of tons of plastic are thoughtlessly dumped into landfills or in our precious oceans, increasing our global problem. In recent decades, plastic pollution has become a global pandemic that urgently needs a global response.

When China stopped taking the world's plastic in 2019, a few of us in Taos had an idea: Why don't communities turn their waste into walls, all over the world? Plastic is an obvious material to repurpose locally for building since it is lightweight, waterproof, flexible, insulative, and has a high tensile strength when crushed, exerting an outward force to make the panels surprisingly rigid.

Why is this RediWall inside Hotel Willa?

In 2020, The Repurposing Plastic Project [RPP] was born through TiLT (Taos Initiative for Life Together). Over the past four years, Randy Martinez, Todd Wynward and the rest of the RPP crew have used this technology to create privacy patios, perimeter walls, a tool shed, windbreaks, a studio/barn, even a carport and workshop. Two structures built of repurposed plastic have even been approved by Taos County Planning & Zoning building inspectors, thanks to architect Doug Eichelberger.

Hotel Willa was the first corporation in Taos to contract RPP to build a wall out of repurposed plastic for their new hotel. You might not have noticed it as you came in--it's the humble, attractive perimeter parking wall that protects the front of the hotel property from the busy streetscape. Conventionally, these types of walls are built out of thousands of pounds of imported cement block...but this one contains more than 2000 pounds of Taos' repurposed plastic!

RPP has now diverted more than 60,000 pounds of plastic from the Taos landfill over the last four years. Even though this is a lot of plastic, it is only a tiny fraction of our community's waste. A fraction, and yet a demonstration of the possible. We challenge other local businesses to follow in Hotel Willa's footsteps, and help create a sustainable local economy for repurposed plastic products. This RediWall hanging in front of you is an inspiring and artistic example of something creative we all can do with what we call "waste." By repurposing the plastic we have and reducing the amount we still buy, communities everywhere can create art together: the art of living in better relation with the land that nurtures us.
