Tena Koutou Katoa,

We have had a really busy start to the term with a big focus on 'What makes Mangonui unique'. We live in such an amazing place, surrounded by the sea and bush. We want our students to understand that this rohe is special, that they are connected to this place and that their actions impact upon it. Learning about where they come from builds their identity of who they are and also their role of kaitiaki. We live in a time where a lot of people are moving to and visiting the Far North. There will be huge pressure on our resources and it is our responsibility to ensure that they are looked after so they are healthy and plentiful. We will be doing a lot of exploring!





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Last week I attended a Te Hiku Kanui Ako meeting. This is the name for the twenty plus schools that formed a cluster to work together to lift achievement in the Far North. Slowly but surely things are coming together with this massive group of teachers and principals. At the beginning of the year the Kanui Ako consulted with the Muriwhenua tribes and got some very clear information on what they would like to see. There has also been consultation with students, Boards, Teachers and whanau. The following is a vision statement that gives a good idea of the direction this cluster will taking.

Aspirations for whanau

Tamariki and whānau are at the core of our mahi. Hauora is integral to learning. We are committed to removing barriers to wellbeing and creating a safe and supportive environment that nurtures and encourages positive growth and change. Te Hiku Kāhui Ako fosters and encourages authentic relationships where all voices are heard based around inclusion and the shared aspirations of improving outcomes for our tamariki. We respect differences and diversity. Appropriate resources are available to cultivate, nurture and put into practice cultural values, therefore understanding the histories, traditions and languages of Te Hiku o Te Ika. We value the upholding of te ao Maori through te reo me ona tikanga and Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

How we work together

We participate collaboratively in a meaningful way around our shared goals and outcomes. Education, Health and Social Services align their strategies to iwi strategies. All voices are heard and encouraged to partake during group inquiry gatherings across Te Hiku Kāhui Ako. Our intention is to front up to issues and we are honest in our dealings with all stakeholders. A genuine commitment is evident to removing barriers and forging partnerships connecting iwi, whānau and kura under a shared purpose. We respect differences, diversity and practices of cultural groups.

Ako

We identify the value of all tamariki in supporting cultural heritage and personal identity for all. Quality teaching, high subject content knowledge, cultural competence and a well-managed learning space of passionate engagement and unique teaching practices is evident. All kaiako are confidently versed in the principles of 'Te Aho Matua'. By 2030, all teachers will be fluent in te reo Māori. The learning environment encourages and supports extended exploration for learners to select multiple learning pathways from across Te Hiku. The local environment influences a basis, for curriculum development that supports and extends prior learning, local resources and planning. There is collaboration within and between sectors to ensure seamless transitions for tamariki and whanau. We teach to the child not to the curriculum to ensure that each child is given the opportunity to share their prior learning, their local curriculum knowledge and experiences.

Summary

Authentic relationships based around inclusion and shared aspirations will improve outcomes for our tamariki. Ultimately, the akonga is truly at the heart, and at the table, where all decisions affecting the learner are made.

A powerful and aspirational statement that will challenge all schools in the Far North. Working together, acknowledging and sharing each others strengths will be a great step forward for education in the Far North. The next step for the Kanui Ako will be to identify great teachers and have them working across our schools sharing their practices.

NIKO HURIWAKA






