Plan and script Students first make a script for the video and then practise reading their script out loud. Further instructions:

Imagine that you are talking freely to your friend.

Also think a suitable background for the video, for example, It be your favourite place.

Plan the video shoot so that there isn't, for example, too much traffic noise in the background.
